

Spencer Bridge Sinks 18 Inches—The old highway bridge across the Niobrara river, near the Spencer hydro dam, decided to sink about 18 inches during the weekend. The incident temporarily prevents use of the south approach. The bridge is used primarily by Consumers Public Power employees going to and from the power plant. Water at the river has been diverted this summer while repair work is in progress and the diversion may be accountable for the settling.

Wheat Voting at Three Places

This Is Last Date for Soil Signup

Today (Thursday) is the final day for signup for the 1937 soil bank program. Meanwhile, wheat raisers will be voting Friday, July 21, on the referendum issue at three places in the county: O'Neill—Holt county courthouse basement; Page—Old Fellows hall; Atkinson—American Legion club. A national average wheat price support has been set at \$2 per bushel if wheat marketing quotas are approved in Friday's referendum. This means that wheat farmers can look forward to a continuation of the present support rate for next year's crop if at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the July 20 referendum are favorable. If wheat marketing quotas for the 1937 crop are not approved in the coming referendum, wheat support will be at 50 percent of parity, which currently figures out at \$1.21 per bushel. This also would cause a downward pressure on the market price of wheat, according to Holt County Agent A. Neil Dawes. Allotments will remain in effect even if the referendum is voted down because farmers are voting on market quotas and not on acreage allotments. If the quotas are approved, price supports will be available to each farmer who complies with his farm wheat acreage allotment. The support price applies only to the commercial wheat states. Farmers in these commercial wheat states who will have more than 15 acres of wheat on a farm for harvest in 1937 are eligible to vote. Although Holt county is not a strong wheat producing county, farmers still should vote.
