

He suffered a broken back about 4 p.m., the day before when he fell from an apple tree at the Frank Hanel farm, located three miles south of Atkinson. Mr. Thurlow was in the tree shaking apples from a limb when

The accident was witnessed by Mrs. Hanel and by a 14year-old boy, Dan Hurley, jr., who was visiting at the farm. The injured man was taken to the hospital by a doctor.
