Air Safety to Get Another Assist

LINCOLN—Air safety is going to get another assist in Nebraska, this time from the civil aeronautics administration. Nebraska's state aeronautics department, now headed by Steve Gilbert, has long been noted for its progress in making flying safer for pilots in the state. In recent months, the department completed establishment of a six-city air network of radio navigational aids for pilots. These are at Norfolk, Ainsworth, Alliance, McCook, Kearney and Beatrice. In addition, the CAA operates similar facilities at North Platte, Omaha, Chadron, Grand Island, Sidney and Scottsbluff. In short, a pilot can fly a radio beam from these points thus being sure of his position. The most recent boost by the CAA is an announcement that during the current fiscal year it is going to establish new stations at Beatrice and O'Neill. This will require the state to move its location at Beatrice to some other station. The state network augments this time in addition to safety, to prepare airports for the coming jet age in commercial and private flying. Nebraska's cost of maintaining its state system yearly is \$5,000. Cities pay half the cost up to \$2,500. The CAA stations are maintained with federal funds. Gilbert said Nebraska welcomes the new stations and would like as many more as the CAA wants to establish. The CAA contracts are expected to be let in November. The Frontier Woman New Way to Make Apple Butter

By BLANCHE SPANN PEASE, Homemaking Editor One of these days, you'll be getting all set to make some old-fashioned apple butter and I just wonder if you wouldn't like to make it the new-fashioned way. Anyway, this is the quick way I make it and we like it fine.

QUICK APPLE BUTTER Five cups (about 16) apples, three cups water, one 3/4-ounce box powdered fruit pectin, one teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon allspice, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, four drops red food coloring, seven cups sugar. Wash, quarter and core apples. Add water, cook until tender. Put through food mill or coarse sieve. Add powdered fruit pectin, spices and red coloring. Heat to boiling. Stir in sugar, bring to full rolling boil. Cook two minutes, stirring constantly. Skim, pour into hot sterilized jars and seal. Makes four pints. Here is the best recipe I have found for—

TOMATO CATSUP One cup white vinegar, 1 1/2 teaspoons whole cloves, 1 1/2 teaspoons broken stick cinnamon, eight pounds ripe tomatoes (about 25 medium tomatoes), one tablespoon chopped onion, 1/4 teaspoon red pepper, one cup sugar, four teaspoons salt, one teaspoon celery seed. Combine vinegar and spices and cover. Heat to boiling, remove from heat, let stand. Scald and peel tomatoes. Mash, add onion. Cook 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Put through food mill or coarse sieve. Add sugar, heat to boiling. Cook until mixture is reduced half, about 45 to 60 minutes. Strain vinegar and spice mixture, discard spices. Add vinegar and salt to thickened tomato sauce. Heat to boiling. Simmer to desired consistency, 30 to 40 minutes, stirring frequently. Seal in hot, sterilized jars. Makes two pints.
