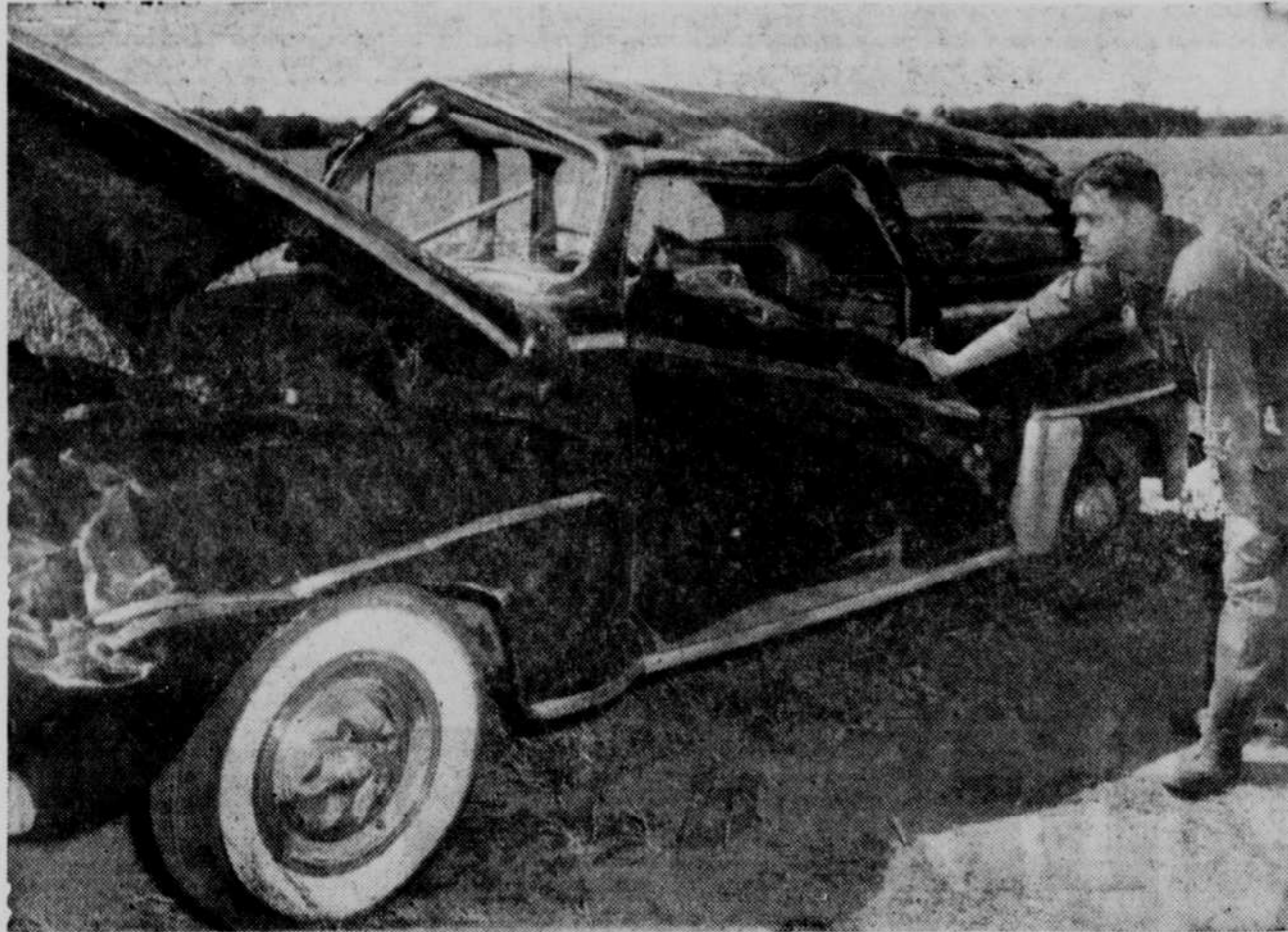
Choir Formed—CHAMBERS—A group of 16 interested in a choir met at the Methodist church Monday evening for an organizational session.
