Many hours of painstaking work and \$9.36 in materials have gone into the colorful creation, which included a white taffeta dress, golden beads, 20 dozen small seed pearls.

The doll version of Elizabeth includes purple train (50 cents), white nylon net underskirt (30 cents), white ribbon necklace (\$1.80), white ribbon for bows (10 cents), skin of golden embroidery floss for tassels (5 cents).

The black-and-white photo doesn't begin to do justice to the handwork and artwork put into the model.
