The game was played at Springview. The Cards' attack improved as the game wore on. Schneider got the first drive underway with a 14-yard jaunt and, four plays later, McGinn finished the 75-yard march with a 17-yard hustle

Larry Tomlinson, moved up from the second string, picked up a midfield fumble and raced 59 yards to score the second TD. Gerry Holly added the point, making the count 13-0.

Two plays later, Gene O'Neill recovered a fumble on the Cards' 40. Seven plays later Schneider bulldozed across and Holly hit the PAT.

The Indians intercepted an SMA aerial at about the academy 40 and scored—the only Indian touchdown. Schneider allowed 43 yards—to Springview's 20—on the kick-off. Holly pitched to Jim McGinn for another 10 and the half ended, 20-7.
