

Tigers Win Rock 'Em, Sock 'Em Game, 28-0

EWING—The Ewing Tigers, improving each game since the reversal in the season's opener, ran roughshod over the Battle Creek team under the lights here Friday night.

But the visitors kept the game interesting through most of the second period. It was strictly rock 'em, sock 'em until Ewing posted a third period TD and stretched the lead to 21-0, converting on every extra point. It was curtains for B. C. in the final period when two successive 15-yard penalties set up the Tigers deep in B. C. territory.

Ray Turner, 127-pound halfback competing his first year, zoomed across on a handoff with the fourth and final TD near the game's end. Flip to Francis Heumesser for the PAT ended the scoring.

Ewing's first score came in the opening period when Jack Sisson flipped a 28-yard pass to Sonny Carl, who raced 30 yards to score. Sisson sneaked for the point.

In the second stanza, Sisson rambled 34 yards on a keeper and Carl added the point on a plunge.

The third TD came in the third period—a pass Sisson to

Carl. The flip covered 15 yards; Carl stepped off 50 yards into pay territory.

Bob Welke, Larry Rotherham and Heumesser were defensive standouts. Blocking of Turner and Heumesser also sparked for Coach Fritz Reifert's Tiger's, who lost the opener to Basset, then proceeded to clobber Pilger and Battle Creek. The Ewing team goes to Atkinson Friday night.

Broncos Strike Twice in First

STUART—The Stuart high school Broncos entertained the Springview Indians on the local grid Friday night, September 26. The score was Stuart 20, Springview 7.

The Broncos struck twice the first quarter for drives of 70 and 75 yards and a 14-0 lead then played mediocre ball the last 3 quarters.

Don Schmadeger scored both touchdowns. Plunges by Jerry Taylor, sophomore halfback added the last six points on a 12-yd. sweep capping a 65 yard drive and a quarter. Judeman, Springview quarterback gave the Indians their only TD on a 5-yard sweep after a Springview pass going 30 yards set it up.

Two Stuart regulars sat out the 3rd quarter and another missed most of the 4th quarter as Stuart was forced to be content playing defensive ball the second half. Springview's main threat was the forward pass although only 3 were completed, 2 went for nice gains.

The Broncos threw 5 times completing two for 45 yards. Stuart showed power on the ground working up 250 yards rushing.

Stuart is idle next week in preparation for its annual homecoming battle with Atkinson.

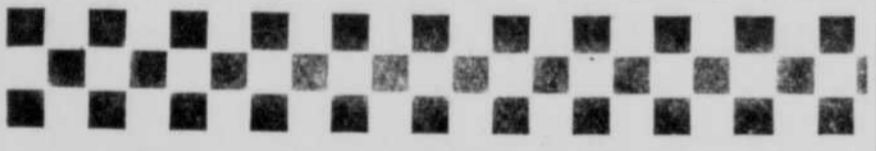

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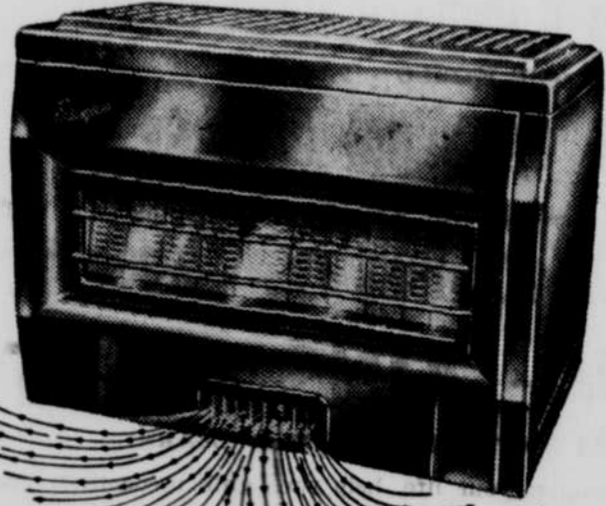
