NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Sealed bids will be received at the office of the Department of Roads and Irrigation in the State Capitol at Lincoln, Nebraska, on November 1, 1956, until 10:00 o'clock A.M., and at that time publicly opened and read for GRADING, DETOUR, CULVERTS, SEEDING, GRANULAR FILL, BITUMINOUS SAND BASE COURSE, ARMOR COAT, BITUMINOUS MAT SURFACE COURSE and incidental work on the ATKINSON-O'NEILL Federal Aid Primary Project, No. F-158(5) Federal Aid Road.

The proposed work consists of constructing 5.5 miles of Oiled Road.

Proposals for this work will be issued to contractors who are qualified to submit proposals for bituminous surfacing.

The attention of bidders is directed to the Required Provisions covering subletting or assigning the contract.

The attention of bidders is invited to the fact that the Department of Roads and Irrigation has been advised by the Wage and Hour Division, U.S. Department of Labor, that contractors engaged in highway construction work are required to meet the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 (52 Stat. 1060), as amended.

The minimum wage paid to all skilled labor employed on this contract shall be one dollar and sixty cents (\$1.60) per hour.

The minimum wage paid to all intermediate labor employed on this contract shall be one dollar and thirty cents (\$1.30) per hour.

The minimum wage paid to all unskilled labor employed on this contract shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per hour.

Plans and specifications for the work may be seen and information secured at the office of the Division Engineer of the Department of Roads and Irrigation at Ainsworth, Nebraska, or at the office of the Department of Roads and Irrigation at Lincoln, Nebraska.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish bond in an amount equal to 100% of his contract.

As an evidence of good faith in submitting a proposal for this work, the bidder must file with his proposal a certified check made payable to the Department of Roads and Irrigation in an amount not less than nine thousand (9,000) dollars.
