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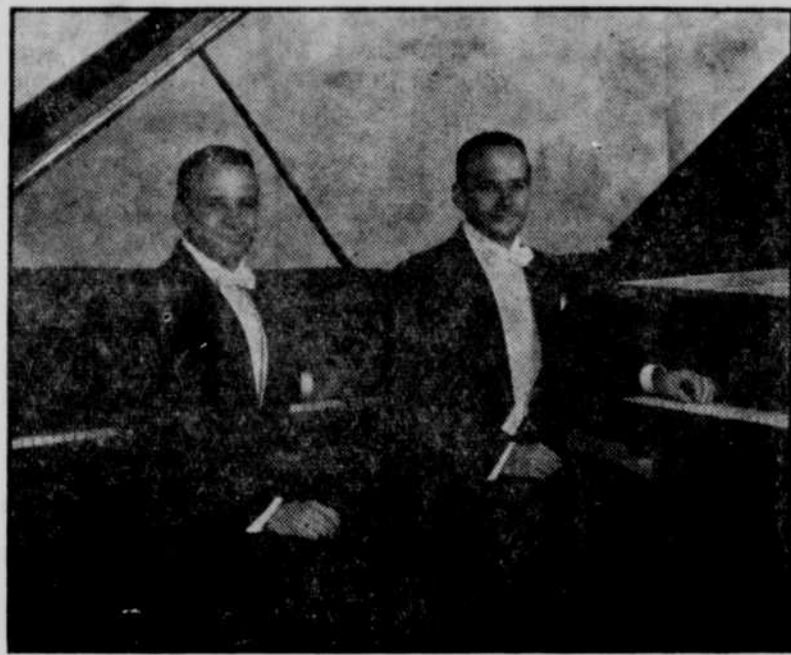

1957 Chevrolets Going on Display

The 1957 Chevrolet automobiles will go on display Friday in dealers' showrooms throughout the nation, including the A. Marcellus Chevrolet Co., at O'Neill.

Highlights of the 1957 Chevrolet exterior design include front and rear bumper assemblies blending into the body, twin lance wheelspats on the hood and flared rear fenders.

Overall length of the passenger cars is increased to a total of 200 inches with the wheel base remaining at 115 inches. The lowered hood emphasizes the horizontal sweep of the body lines to the flared fender fins for balanced beauty.

The customer has his choice of 460 model - color combinations, almost one-third more than available at the outset of 1956 production. Of the 17 exterior colors seven are new. There are 16 solids and 15 two-tone selections.

Offered in the line are one six and four eight-cylinder engines, ranging in horsepower from 140 to 233.
