## Sacred Heart Triumphs, 34-13

### More Injuries Hit Cardinals

One St. Mary's griddler suffered a broken leg, one other had to leave the game, and two others were banged up Thursday night as the Sacred Heart Knights of Norfolk won a 34-13 decision over the Cardinals in Carson park here.

Jerry McGinn, fleet halfback, had his leg fractured in a skirmish involving what some of the O'Neill partisans regarded as non-necessary roughness. He is now on crutches.

Bill Craig, filling in for Capt. Tom Schneider (hurt a week earlier) also was injured and had to quit the playing field for the evening in order to recoup. Gary Holly and Jim Enright bled.

The injury-riddled Cards went into the game minus the services of Schneider, Jim Froelich, Jim Becker and Larry Cleary—all regulars a year ago. Coach Don Templemeyer was in the ironic position of having more potential strength represented among the cripples than he could put onto the field.

St. Mary's recovered a Sacred Heart fumble and scored first in the opening stanza with Craig carrying it over from the one. Bruce Weier passed to Larry Donohoe for the extra point.

Penalties slowed the Knights on a second period drive in

which Ralph Vincent was doing most of the ball logging. After a punt exchange, Vincent flipped to Ralph Determan for a TD and Vincent punted for the PAT, tying the count, 7-7. Gary Holly and Jim McGinn collaborated for consistent gains through the Norfolk line to set up SMA's second TD, which came on a pass, Holly to Larry Tomlinson. The PAT try failed and the half ended, 14-13, in favor of the visitors.

In the third period the SMA injuries and lack of an effective pass defense enabled the Knights to roll.

Vincent returned the second-half kickoff 25 yards to the 27 and moved to the SMA 28 on ground plays. Vincent hit Determan with a jump pass on a TD play, but the effort was nullified by a Sacred Heart penalty.

After an exchange, the Knights took over on the SMA 33 and an aerial, Vincent to Determan, carried for a TD. Gary Svoboda punted for the point, 21-13.

The Knights scored again on a nifty run by Svoboda, who raced 43 yards. The try for point failed, 27-13.

Sacred Heart blocked a SMA kick on the Cardinals' 19 and promptly converted on a 19-yard pass from Vincent to Peschel. Vincent added the PAT with a dropkick.

The game almost turned into a rout when Tom Spring went across in the closing minutes, but officials ruled holding and the TD was nullified.

It was Sacred Heart's fifth win in six starts and St. Mary's second loss in five starts.
