

### Ewing Tigers Punish Tilden in Homecoming

#### Royalty Crowned At 47-0 Rout

Attendants for the queen were Linda Tuttle, senior; Beverly Rotherham and Patty Wright, who tied for the honor in the junior class; Carolyn Tams, sophomore; and Lois Kaczor, freshmen.

The king's attendants were Turner, senior, "Sonny" Carl, junior; Jerry Hahlbeck, sophomore; and Tom Koenig, freshmen.

Crown bearers were the senior attendants, Miss Tuttle, wearing the king and Ray Turner, the queen. A bouquet of red roses was presented the queen and an orchid corsage.

Russell Napier was master of ceremonies, giving the welcome and describing each float as it passed in the parade. Each class and all organizations were represented.

Turner tallied first for Ewing in the opening stanza and Sonny Carl bootlegged the ball around his own left end and rambled 40 yards for the second TD.

Bob Tams got into the scoring column in the second period with a plunge and the half ended, 21-0, having made good on all conversions.

Tilden tried a spread formation but illegal formations cost a succession of penalties.

Ray Turner worked on the running end of a sleeper play, taking a pass from Jack Sisson. The play took Turner down the

west sidelines and the score mounted to 27-0.

Before the rains came, Carl intercepted a Tilden aerial and ran 85 yards to score.

The Pep club elects the king and attendants while the queen and her attendants are chosen by the E club.

A dance was held at St. Dominic's hall after the game.
