

Amherst Wrecks SMA in Arapahoe Bowl

The St. Mary's academy Cardinals' first venture into an end-of-the-season bowl game failed Monday night when the Cards fell, 32-13, in the Arapahoe Legion bowl. It was a veterans day game played under the lights.

The Broncos from Amherst jumped to a 14-0 lead in the first period while twice fooling the O'Neill crew with naked reverses.

The Cards bounced back and marched 50 yards in 12 plays to send Tommy Donohoe across.

But the parochial eight-man-ners were outmanned and outplayed by a superior, unbeaten Amherst club.

The Cards made the trip by chartered bus, returning that night.

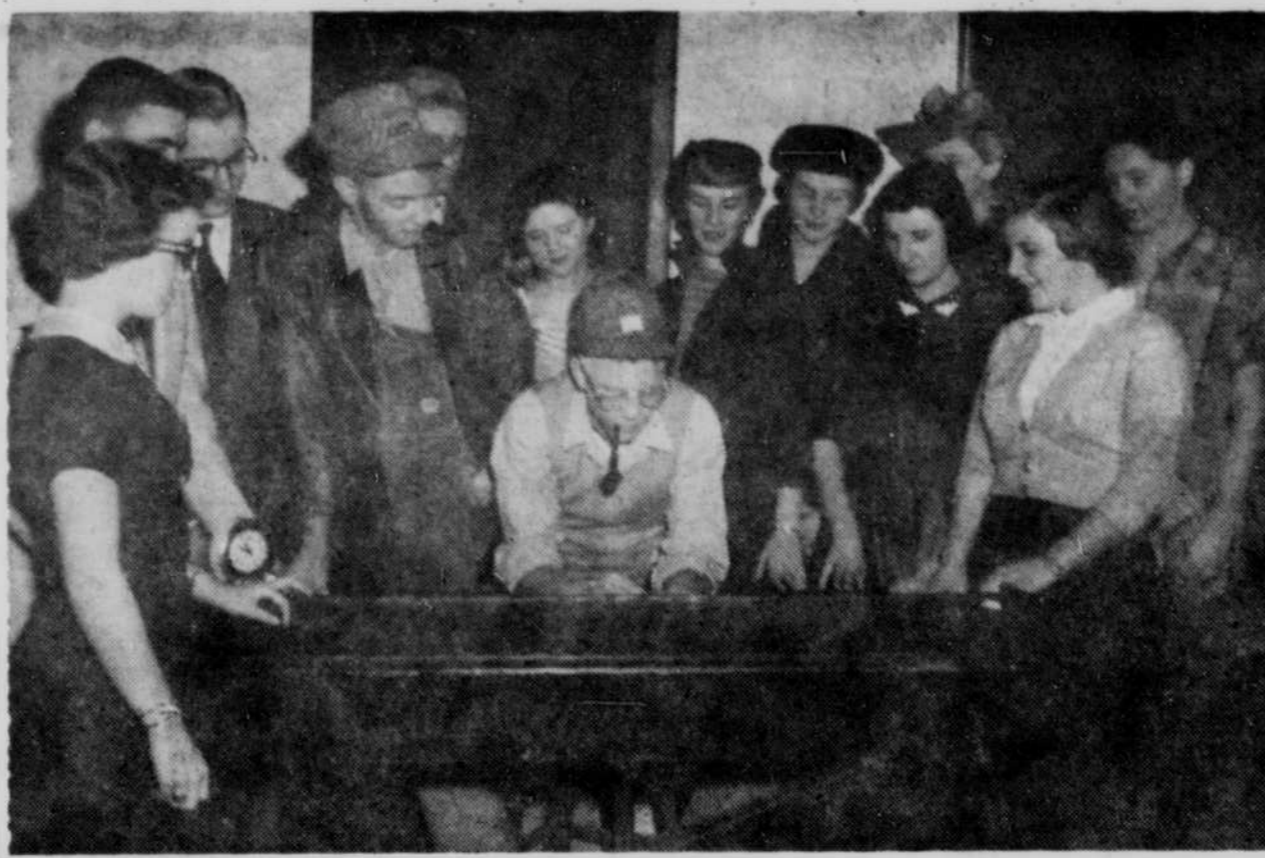
755-Pound Steers Sell in S.C. for \$19.95

Two Holt county shippers sold yearling steers on the Sioux City market Monday, as some 27,600 head of cattle and calves went on sale. The run included 10,600 head of calves.

Holt county shippers on the market included Neil B. Ryan, of O'Neill, with 30 head of fleshy yearling steers. The steers averaged 755 pounds and sold for \$19.75. He also had 28 other steers weighing 740 pounds at \$19.50.

Also from Holt county, Peter Meyer and son of Atkinson, sold 35 yearling steers at \$18.50 and 43 head at \$18.00.

The cattle sold on a stronger market that saw yearling steers top at \$21.25, paid on Nebraska cattle. Yearling heifers reached \$17.00, with that figure also set by Nebraska cattle. Steer calves sold to \$26.00 and heifer calves up to \$20.00.

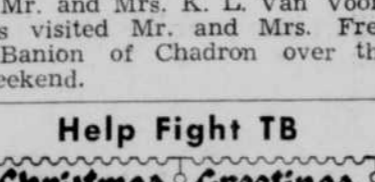

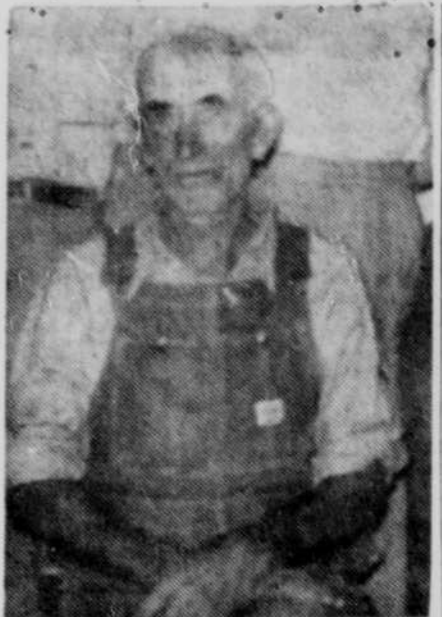
