State Capitol News . . . **Budgets Sent Back** 

# for Down Revisions

LINCOLN - The enormity of the task facing the 1957 legislature becomes more apparent each time a state agency makes its

request for tax money.

Budget hearings before Gov. Victor Anderson have been under way more than a week and the order of the day is requests for more money from taxpayers. "We just can't raise taxes as much as these budgets coming

in," the governor said. Illustrating the problems more graphically, the state's chief ex-ecutive said: "We are going to eliminate the frosting and get down to eating hardtack."

The governor made a series of statements concerning budgets during hearings. They included: -The cost of operating the State Orthopedic hospital in Lincoln is getting too high for the patient load. The problem may have reached the point where it may become neccessary to close the hospital and contact elsewhere for patient care.

-There may need to be increases in tuition fees for out-ofstate students attending either of the four state-supported teachers colleges or the University of Ne-

braska The board of control should study ways of making full use of the State Tubercular hospital at

Regarding the Orthopedic hospital, the governor said the last patient count by the board of control showed 59 at the institution and 122 employees with a two-year budget of some \$590,-000. "That's too expensive," the governor said.

But Dr. F. A. Alcorn, hospital superintendent, disputed the governor's figures. He said the patient load is nearer 4,500 per year including out patients and service to other state institutions. 

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
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
