Your Highway Problems

(Editor's note: The following is the first in a series of articles to appear in The Frontier, written by Owen J. Boyles, secretary of the Nebraska highway commission).

From the caption of this article "Your Highway Problem", it is my belief that this applies to each and every individual of this state for the reasons that you and I are a part of the government of this state, and no matter how good our officials are and unless we support them and take a personal interest in a good program, our state cannot advance as fast as we would like to have our highways improved or constructed.

What must we have to provide for a good road program? 1. We must have competent highway officials in the planning, building and maintaining of our state highways which now exceed 9,000 miles. I am proud to say that the citizens of this state need not take a second place to any other state in the nation, for in my humble opinion we have the best of highway officials.

2. We must have a yardstick so to speak for a system which by its own application places construction or improvements of present routes upon the merits of each highway with relation to each other. This state of Nebraska has and it is known as the sufficiency rating which takes in the following factors: condition, economic factors, such as the remaining life and maintenance cost, safety and service such as surface width, sight distance, alignment, passing opportunity, surface adequacy and consistency. It is my belief that I can state without contradiction that there are no longer political highways being built in the State of Nebraska.

3. We must have sufficient state revenues in order that our highway departments may take advantage of all federal appropriations made available to the state. Now if there be any deficiencies in this, and I am quite sure there is, then it is in the manner of distribution of highway user's fees made available to the state.

For those of you who are not too familiar with the manner and allocation of highway user's revenues collected in Nebraska, which are a 6-cent state gasoline tax and the registration fees collected on motor vehicles, the following is the distribution made among the state, counties and cities.

From each \$06 tax on gasoline, the state highway department receives for construction after administration costs are deducted, \$03 1/2 of the total; the counties and cities receive \$02 1/2 or approximately 42 percent of the total gasoline tax, the 42 percent of the gas tax to the counties and cities which we are speaking of is the total tax paid by resident of the entire state regardless of the county of residence, the total amount is then distributed under a formula established by the legislature. Of the registration fees, the state receives for highway purposes 40 percent of the total and the counties and cities 60 percent.

In the past few months, I am quite sure that each of you have

either read or heard of the federal aid highway act of 1956, which was just recently passed by congress and is now law and did among many other things provide for an additional \$01 per gallon federal gasoline tax, making a total \$03 per gallon federal tax on motor fuels and in addition the new act provides for additional excise tax on batteries, tires and so forth.

Now in facing our highway problem, I believe it behooves each of us to acquaint ourselves with the importance of the highway user's revenues we pay. I make this point, for the federal

taxes on gasoline and excise tax that each of us pay is allocated to our state as federal funds to be expended on highways, and in the event certain requirements are not met with a given time, it is then possible that the federal funds available to the state of Nebraska for the state, county or city may be reallocated to another state, which has sufficient state revenues to match the added allocations. As above stated, the share of federal allocations made to us is original monies paid by you and I as residents of this state and we should and must find some solution relative as to matching them with state revenues in order that the people of Nebraska will not be building highways in some other state. All of our federal aid monies appropriated to our state and subdivisions must be matched with federal and 50 percent state funds in the ratio of 50 percent except the limited interstate funds which were previously allocated on a 60 percent federal and 40 percent state and the new monies allocated, under the 1956 federal aid highway act for the interstate system are on a 90 percent federal and 10 percent for state or city routes.
