Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Grimes and Mrs. Reed Bell were Sunday dinner guests at the Clyde Kiltz home.

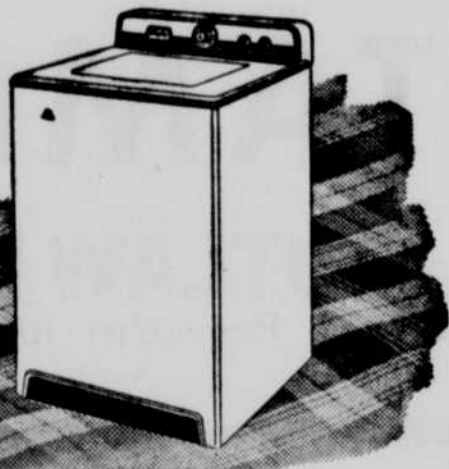

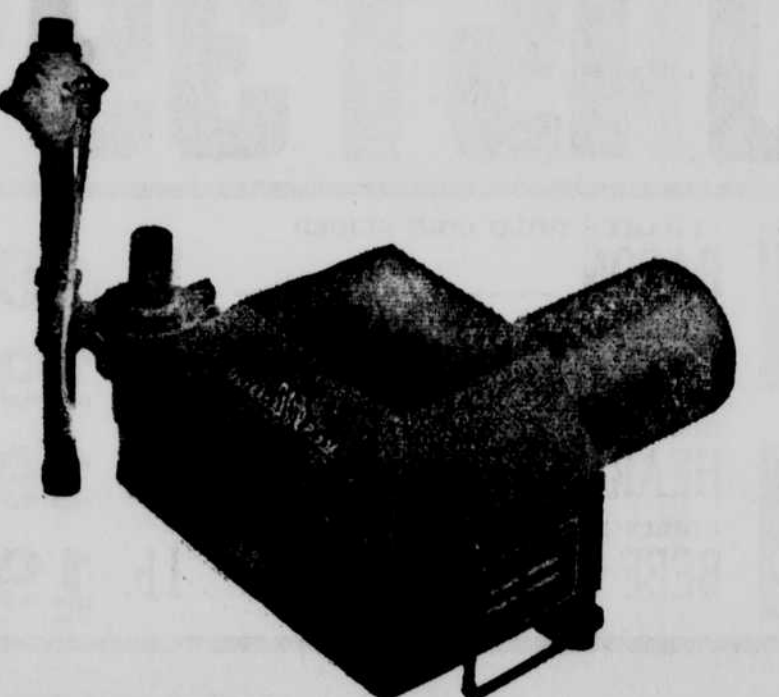
