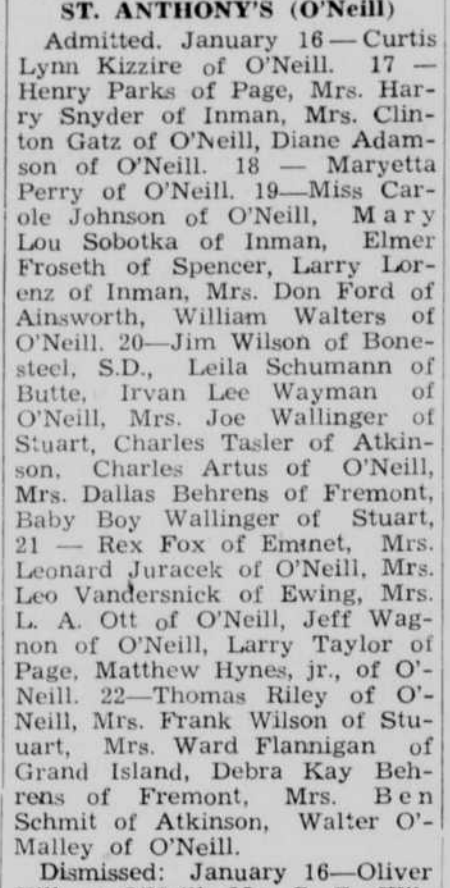

The Consumers power men are installing new 40-ft. poles to replace older poles (leaning at right). The job will cost Consumers Public Power about \$4,000.

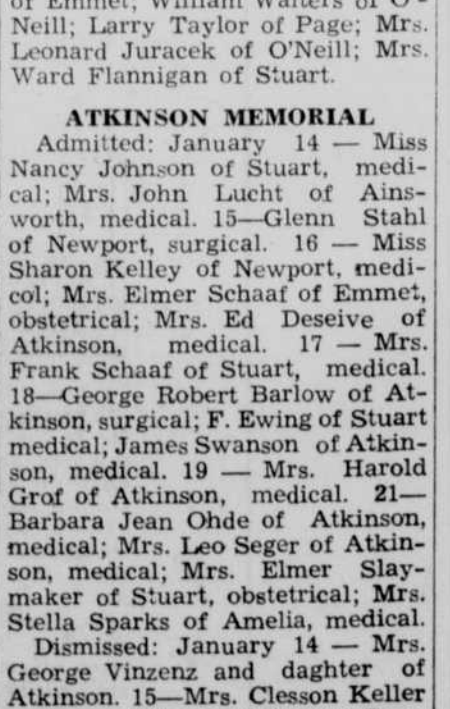
Consumers' goal is to "push" better voltage in the area and increase efficiency.

Branded for a Good Breakfast

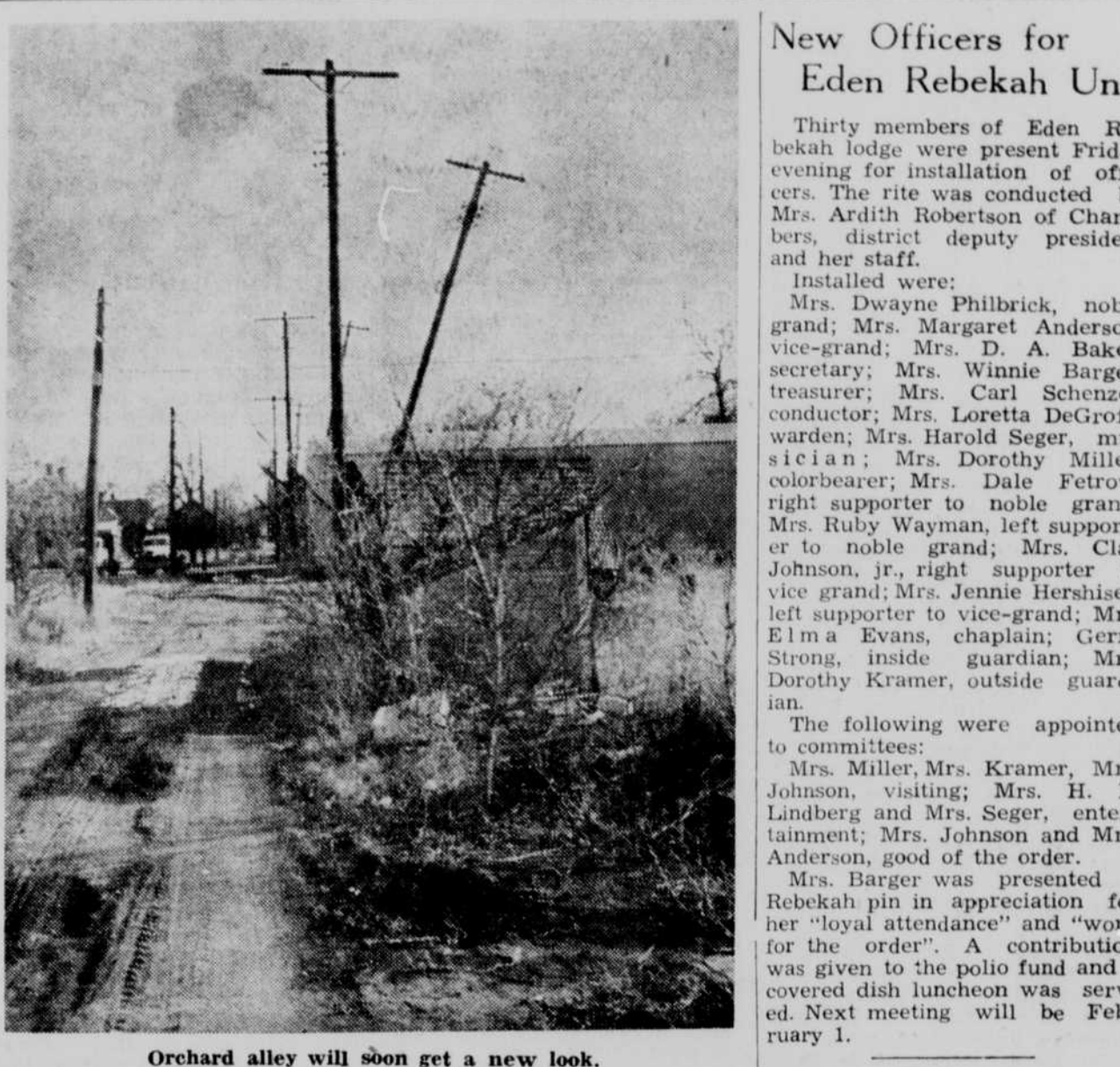

½ pound sausage 2 tablespoons cubed process cheese
4 eggs ½ teaspoon paprika
¼ cup milk 4 slices enriched bread toast
Brown sausage in a medium sized skillet and pour off ¼ cup drippings. Beat eggs and milk together and pour into hot skillet. Sprinkle cheese and paprika over top of egg mixture. Cover and cook slowly for about five minutes, or until eggs are set and cheese melts. Serve ¼ of the egg mixture on each slice of toast.
Yield: 4 servings.
