Violinists Get Together

Kerry-Jarto, 59, a native Hungarian who draws silvery tones from a Stradivarius violin, royally entertained combined audiences of O'Neill public school and St. Mary's academy Wednesday morning. Mr. Jarto and his piano accompanist, Kennedy Freeman, are on tour under National Schools Assemblies management. Earlier in the morning they appeared at Atkinson and in the afternoon they made an appearance at the Spencer public school. "The young audience was very responsive to Schubert's 'Ave Maria,'" explained the maestro. Other well-received selections were Rimski-Korsakov's "Flight of the Bumble Bee" and Chopin's "Minute Waltz." In Royal Courts He began his music career in the Franz Liszt conservatory at six-years-old and was considered a child prodigy. As a youth he was an official violinist in the royal courts of Emperor Otto and Queen Zita of the famous Austro-Hungarian empire. His father was an engineer and taught in Switzerland. Hence, young Jarto got around from an early age. He has circled the world several times with his singing Stradivarius. He made his American debut in Carnegie Hall, New York City, and has no trouble getting bookings. "Talked Shop" Mr. Jarto and his traveling companion, both regarding Hollywood as their home, made a social call on Dean Streeter, O'Neill barber and lover of the violin. Mr. Streeter has a collection of old violins resurrected and repaired by Joel Parker (the latter is no violinist but he rehabilitates the instruments as a hobby). The distinguished visitor caught Mr. Streeter between customers, tested one or two of the "rehab" jobs, and assured Mr. Streeter and Mr. Parker they are on the right track. "Sure, the school audiences like Elvis Presley and that sort," declared Mr. Jarto. "But they liked my music, too. You could hear a pin drop in that auditorium when I was doing the 'Ave Maria'." Operating on a tight schedule, Mr. Jarto and Mr. Freeman cut short their social call, grabbed a lunch and headed for Spencer. "Asked about the recent uprising in his native Hungary, Mr. Jarto said: "There is a lot of prayer and deep feeling behind such a movement. My Hungarian friends showed that it can be done. It's the beginning of the end for communism, as I see it. It's as simple as that. Those red leaders see the handwriting on the wall and Hungary will rise up again. "Wait and see!"
