"The wife had relations in Holt county (Neckolites) and I got to liking it up here. Eighteen years ago we bought this farm, have never had a crop failure, and this is just right.

"Last year our corn averaged over 30 bushels to the acre.

"I don't think much of deep well irrigation. I don't believe in putting that cold water on the crops," he explains, gestulating with his huge ham-sized hands.

He wears several oversized knuckles. Asked about them, he explained they are carryovers from his kid days playing baseball. "Never played any baseball after
