S-T-A Asks Rail Rules Changes

Seven Cents

Would Force C&NW to Furnish Costs and Revenue Figures.

The Save-the-Trains association nas asked the Nebraska state railway commission to amend the rules under which the railroads seek to abandon trains. Object of the change would be to permit more information to be obtained from protesting parties.

The association is trying to preent Chicago & North Western railroad from discontinuing trains. 13 and 14, which offer passengermail-express service on the 454 mile line between Omaha and

pense information. The S-T-A, through Viren, has asked the commission to amenda general order 11, which is dated

April, 1908. Some of the provisions in that order have been generally ignored by all railroads and other carriers down through the years.

A hearing on C&NW's application to abandon these last three trains serving much of north-Nebraska was originally set for November 19 at Valentine. The matter was continued and the commission said it would announce a new date. Another hearing date has not been set.
