Max F. Powell, 65, Cancer Victim
Well-Known in Holt County
 Max Powell, 65, who was well-known in the O'Neill area, died Saturday, February 16, at his home on route 2, Grant's Pass, Ore. He had suffered a long illness of cancer.
 He was born at Mineola, in northern Holt county, October 3, 1891, and at the age of 20 went to Reno, Nev., where he worked as a musician until entering military service in 1918.
 After World War I, he returned to Reno, then went to Stockton until 1921 when he returned to Nebraska.
 In 1924 he was married to Lena Mae Cole and with her came to Corvallis in 1937 where they resided for 14 years, coming to Grant's Pass in 1950.
 Mr. Powell served as county school bus superintendent until ill health forced his resignation last August. He was a member of the Loyal Order of Veterans, the American Legion and the musicians union.
 In addition to his widow, Lena, of Grant's Pass, the deceased leaves a son, Burrell Arden Powell, who is attending college in San Francisco, Calif. and a daughter, Mrs. Keith McLean of Meador, Ore., three grandchildren; two brothers, Vern and Bert Powell, both of Corvallis, Ore.
 Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m., Thursday, February 21, at L. B. hall chapel. Interment was in Hawthorne Memorial park.

 The late Mr. Forslund was born January 2, 1893 on a farm southwest of Clearwater, near St. John's church.
 His parents, Andrew and Caroline, came from Sweden in this section of Nebraska. Fred was the youngest child of their family of nine children.
 He received his education at the Pleasant Hill rural school.
 In February, 1914, he was married to Katie Heinbaugh at Neigh. She preceded him in death.
 On June 21, 1930, he was married to Minerva Merrell at Meadow Grove. To this union one son was born.
 Mr. Forslund made his home many years on a farm about seven miles south-west of Ewing. For several years, he was a salesman for Moorman Mineral company and the Fox Feed company. He also was employed by the Farmers' Mutual Insurance company.
On School Board
 He was active in community affairs, serving on the Deloit township board for many years and 25 years on the school board.
 He was a member of the United Presbyterian church in Ewing. He belonged to the Odd Fellows lodge at Clearwater.
 Survivors include: Widow—Minerva; son—Merrell of Ewing; brother—Carl of Stayton, Ore.; sisters—Mrs. Ruth Spangler of Ewing; Mrs. Jennie Geola of Los Angeles, Calif.; and Mrs. Ella Gustafson of Clarinda, Ia.; numerous nephews and nieces.
