

Paul Serres, 58, Rancher, Dies

Paul Serres, 58, well-known Harrison rancher, died Thursday, March 12, at the Crawford Memorial hospital. He suffered a stroke and was taken immediately to the hospital by ambulance. He died a few hours later, never regaining consciousness.

A rosary service was held at the Catholic church at Harrison and again at the funeral home at Crawford.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m., Saturday, March 16, at the Catholic church at Monroe.

Pallbearers were Michael Boyle, John A. Meier, Ray Simoraska, Bud Simoraska, Charles Morris and John Chleg.

The late Mr. Serres was born in Sioux county, Nebraska, January 21, 1896, the son of Paul and Mary Serres.

On August 11, 1930 he was united in marriage to Ena Barrett, formerly of O'Neill, at the Catholic church in Ardmore, S. D.

They moved to the ranch 20 miles from Harrison where the family still resides.

To this union were born 10 children, two of whom preceded their father in death.

He was also preceded in death by his parents, two infant daughters, Cecelia and Catherine, and three brothers, Joe, Herman and Lewis. The latter died also in infancy in Wisconsin.

Survivors include widow—Ena; sons—Eugene Paul, Floyd Joseph, Joseph Henry, and George Leslie; daughters—Mary Loretta, Eileen, Edna and Helen, all of whom are at home; sisters—Mrs. Mary Morris and Mrs. Catherine Chleg, both of Rumford, S. D.; Mrs. Theresa Kanath of Edgemont, S. D.; and Mrs. Barbara Simoraska of Chadron; brothers—Herman and John, both of Harrison; several nieces and nephews.

600 Attend LB 444 Hearing in Lincoln

The judiciary committee of the Nebraska unicameral legislature conducted a lengthy hearing Wednesday at the state capitol on Sen. Hal Bridenbaugh's LB 444, but took no action.

Some six hundred persons attended the hearing, including sizeable delegations from Holt and Boyd counties. Those who favored the amendment labeled Freeman B. Decker, present state education commissioner, as a dictator.

"The only issue is whether the people involved ought to be trusted to govern themselves," Senator Bridenbaugh said.

Prior to 1952 the chief education officer was elected as state superintendent of public instruction. Nebraska voters approved an amendment establishing a state board of education, which provided for an appointed commissioner of education (Decker).

Bridenbaugh's proposal would put the matter back to the voters, who could decide whether they wished to retain the board-commissioner form or elect a state superintendent.

The Nebraska Small Schools association, born out of the Amelia high school controversy, was represented in force at Wednesday's hearing.
