Car-Truck Collide at Inman Intersection

INMAN—A westbound truck on U. S. highway 20-275 driven by Gene A. Schacht, 19, of Clearwater figured in a collision with a 1950 Chevrolet driven by Rolla F. Parks, 57, of Page. The collision occurred at the intersection at the Jeff Davis filling station about 11:19 a.m. Monday. Park, who had been at Inman on business, was entering onto the highway. The truck sharply turned north on a side road where the collision occurred. The Schacht truck was slightly damaged—about \$10—and damage to the Park machine, owned by the A. Marcellus Chevrolet Co. of O'Neill, was damaged to the extent of about \$250, according to State Patrolmen Gene Hastriter and Robert Gude, who investigated. No one was injured.

O'NEILL LOCALS


