Ronnie Frickel of Atkinson high established a new pole vault record Friday in the annual Wrangler relays at Burwell and helped his mates finish in third position in the 19 - team meet. Frickel soared to 11 feet 7/8ths of an inch.

A record-breaking 440 - yard relay team sped to victory for Ainsworth in the final event of the day to give the Bulldogs, defending state class B champs, the top honors.

Ainsworth nudged the Broken Bow Indians for the Wrangler title. Atkinson was third and Loup City was fourth.

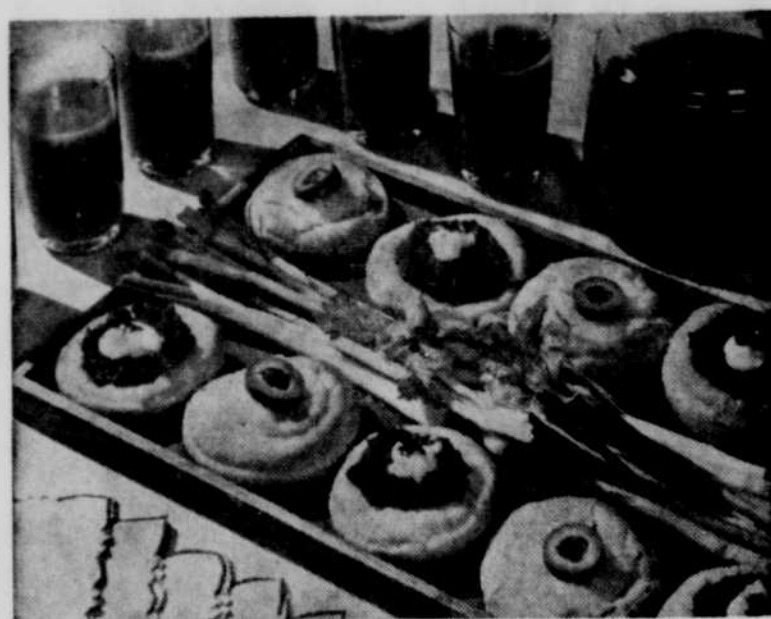
To Reach Long Beach on April 10—

Active dry yeast for baking is available at a bargain at your grocers now — three packages for the price of two.

MINIATURE YEAST-RIZ CRUSTS

1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup shortening
6 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)

Scald milk. Stir in shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten egg and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn out on a lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in well-greased bowl; brush top with shortening. Cover with clean towel. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour and 30 minutes. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Roll so about 1/4-inch thickness. Cut into rounds with a 2-inch cookie cutter or glass. Place rounds on a greased baking sheet. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 20 minutes. Make a depression in the center of each with the bottom of a glass about 1 1/2-inches in diameter. (Dip the glass in flour before each use to prevent sticking.) Brush each round with slightly beaten egg white. Bake at 350° F. (moderate oven) for 8 minutes. Do not remove. To store, cool crusts, stack and wrap in aluminum foil. Hold in refrigerator 1 to 10 days, as needed. When ready to use, fill depressions with cheese or meat spreads and bake at 350° F. (moderate oven) about 15 minutes until crust is golden brown.
