

MINIATURE YEAST-RIZ CRUSTS

1/3 cup milk 1/4 cup shortening 6 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 4 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)

I package or cake yeast, active dry or compressed egg, beaten

23/4 cups sifted enriched flour egg white, slightly beaten

Scald milk. Stir in shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; luke-warm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until warm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten egg and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn out on a lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in well-greased bowl; brush top with shortening. Cover with clean towel. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour and 30 minutes. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Roll so about 14-inch thickness. Cut into rounds with a 2-inch cooky cutter or glass. Place rounds on a greased baking sheet. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 20 minutes. Make a depression in the center of each with the bottom of a glass about 1½-inches in diameter. (Dip the glass in flour before each use to prevent sticking.) Brush each round with slightly beaten egg white. Bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) for 8 minutes. Do not brown. To store, cool crusts, stack and wrap in aluminum foil. Hold in refrigerator 1 to 10 days, as needed. When ready to use, fill depressions with cheese or meat spreads and bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) about 15 minutes until crust is golden brown.
