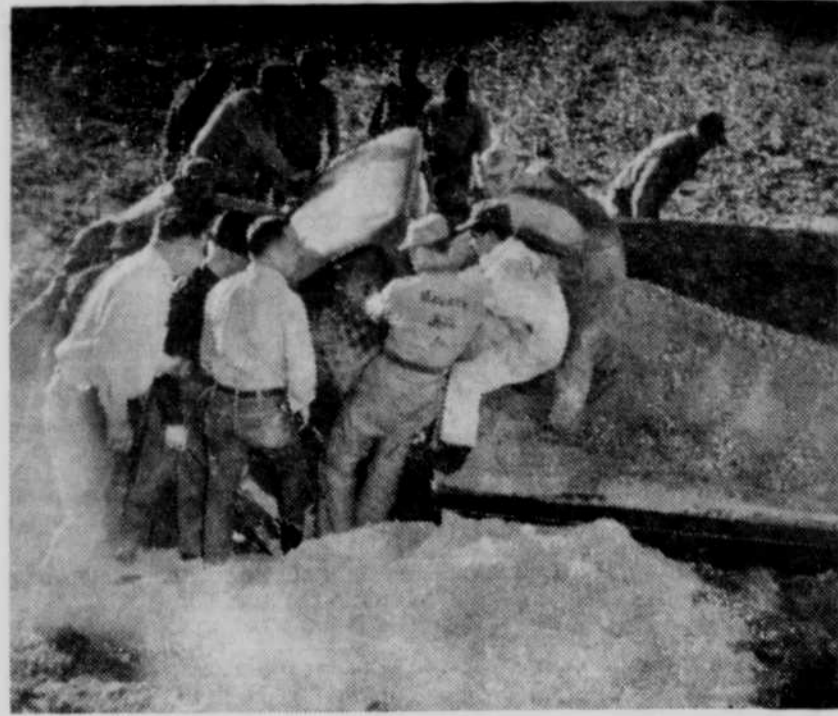

Pair Trapped in Cab 45 Minutes

Two men were injured, one critically, when they were jammed in the cab of a dump truck four miles north of the Scottsbluff sugar factory.

Tom H. Potter, 31, of Mitchell suffered fractures of both feet, a fractured pelvis, broken ribs and severe shock.

Leland Lieb, 31, of Scottsbluff suffered a broken left leg and shock.

They were wedged into the cab when the truck loaded with gravel went off the west side of the road and crashed into an embankment.

The engine pinned them in the front and the gravel box was loosened by the impact and held them from behind. The cab was demolished.

Safety Patrolman Elmer Kohlmeischer investigated. He said the truck was going south and Potter was driving.

Potter had to swerve the truck at an intersection to avoid collision with a car.

The accident happened at 4:45 p.m. The men were pinned inside the cab for 45 minutes while the fire department and other workers attempted to free them. An acetylene torch was used in an effort to cut the men from the tangle of metal, but this started a fire in gasoline that spilled from the tank under the cab.

The fire department quickly extinguished the blaze.

A wrecker was used in an attempt to forcibly free the cab from the gravel box.

Potter and Lieb were making their last trip of the day with a load of gravel.

Lieb is formerly of O'Neill. Both men are still in the hospital.

State Farm Has New Auto Policy

The nation's largest auto insurer this week unveiled a new policy which "recognizes the motorists' need for greater financial protection against the grim and mounting hazards of today's traffic," according to the firm's president, Adlai H. Rust.

Written by State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance company, the policy carries a major medical payments optional coverage.

Ed Thorio, O'Neill agent, said "is the first adaptation in the auto insurance field of a catastrophe-protection principle widely used in modern group health and accident plans."

Five other optional coverages have been added, he said, and all basic coverages of the former standard policy have been broadened "to meet the realities of modern driving conditions."

Major medical expense provisions of the State Farm cover payment of the first \$1,000 of medical expenses resulting from an auto accident injury, plus 80 per cent of additional medical expenses up to total payments of \$5,000 for each person injured. The coverage protects every member of the insured's family living in his household, and there is no limit on the number of persons so covered in any one accident.

"The national accident rate is at a new high," Rust pointed out, "and exposure of the driver to catastrophic accident situations increase daily as more and more high powered cars crowd the streets and highways. These conditions impose an obligation on the auto insurance industry which this policy was expressly designed to meet."

Introduced April 15 in California, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon and Washington, the policy will be available locally after May 1.
