In 1907 they opened a general merchandise store in Orchard. After Mr. Goldsmith's death in 1925, Mrs. Goldsmith continued the store, with the assistance of her sister, Mrs. Pearl Johnson. She sold just about two weeks prior to her death.

Mrs. Goldsmith was a charter member and past worthy matron of Sunset chapter, Order of the Eastern Star; was a member of the EUB church and was active in civic organizations.

She is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Johnson of Orchard, Mrs. Margaret Childs of Harrison, Mrs. Payne of Costa Mesa, Calif., and Mrs. Harry Vickery of Lusk, Wyo.
