C. R. McIntire of Kearney, financial representative of Nebraska Children's Home Society, will be in Holt county shortly to conduct the annual solicitation for funds. The announcement was made by Randall C. Biart, executive director of the society. Said Mr. Biart: "Our job is the care and placement of normal children. Children who are unwanted by their parents come to us for adoptive placement. Children being neglected or abused by their parents may be sent to us by the court, either for temporary care while parents are being given a chance to make good, or they come in with a permanent order for adoptive placement. Unwed, expectant mothers come to us for complete service. Last year 105 children were placed for adoption."
