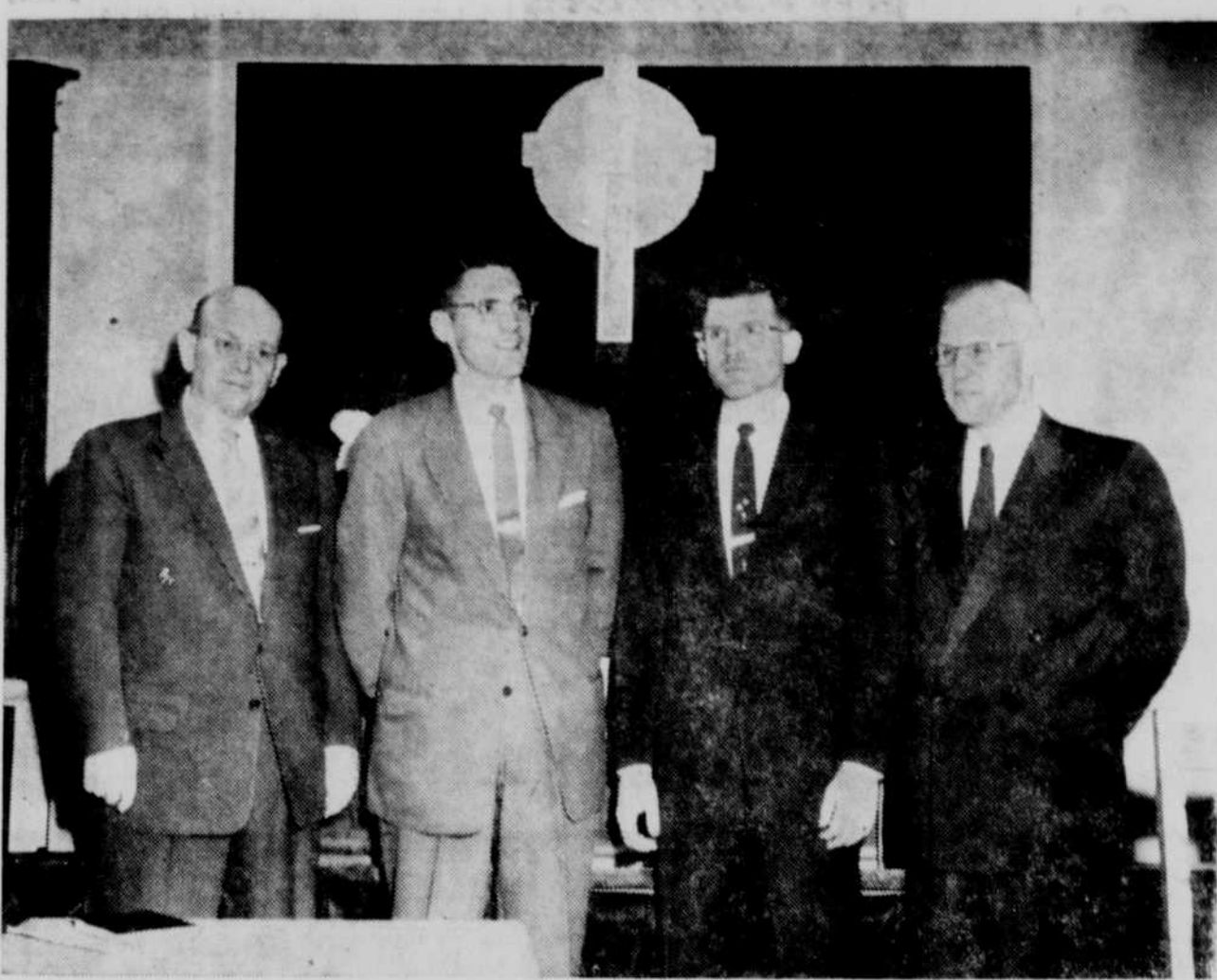

Registration for swimming lessons will be held this week at the municipal swimming pool, which opened here memorial day.

O'Neill residents may register Friday between 9-12 a. m. or 1-4 p. m.

Holt county residents may register Saturday morning from 9-12 o'clock. Saturday afternoon registration will be for those outside Holt and those who were unable to register earlier.

All registration must be by the individual or parents. No group registrations will be accepted. Manager Don Templemeyer said. A registration fee of \$1 payable at time of registration will be charged to all non-residents of O'Neill unless they are holders of a season ticket.

Students will be notified by mail as to the date and time of their respective classes. "Please do not attempt to phone in registrations or call concerning date and time of individual's classes. Notification will be made to all who are registered", Templemeyer declared.
