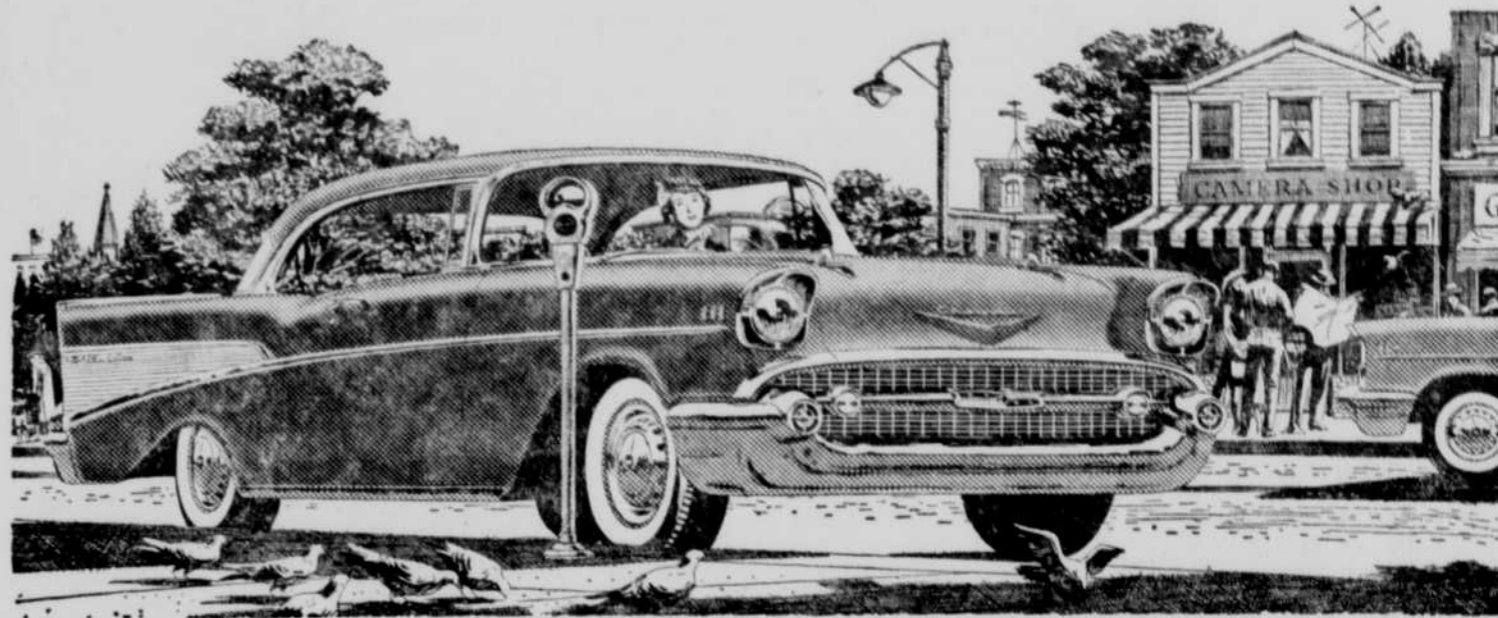
O'NEILL LOCALS

The Misses Barbara and Marde Birmingham left Monday for Omaha where they boarded a plane for New York City. They also plan to visit in Washington, D. C.

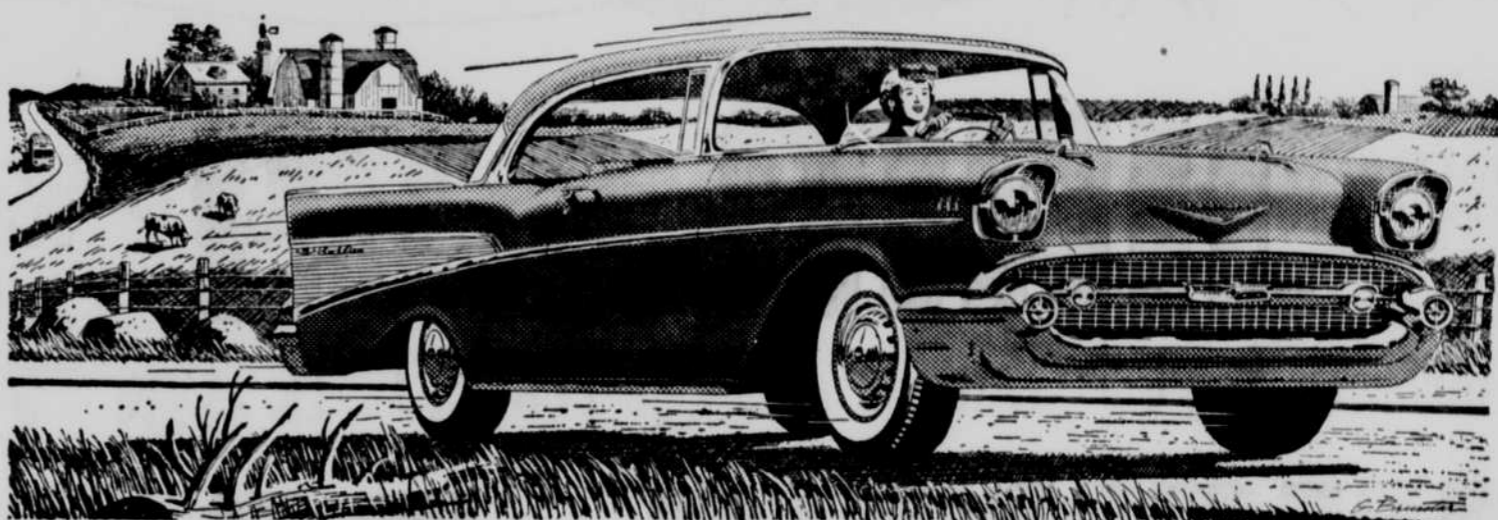
