May 30, 1957

I want to let you know I haven't forgotten my hometown.

Most of the cattle are dairy stock. Have seen no work horses with harness. There is a lot of clearing of sage brush to make room for farms.

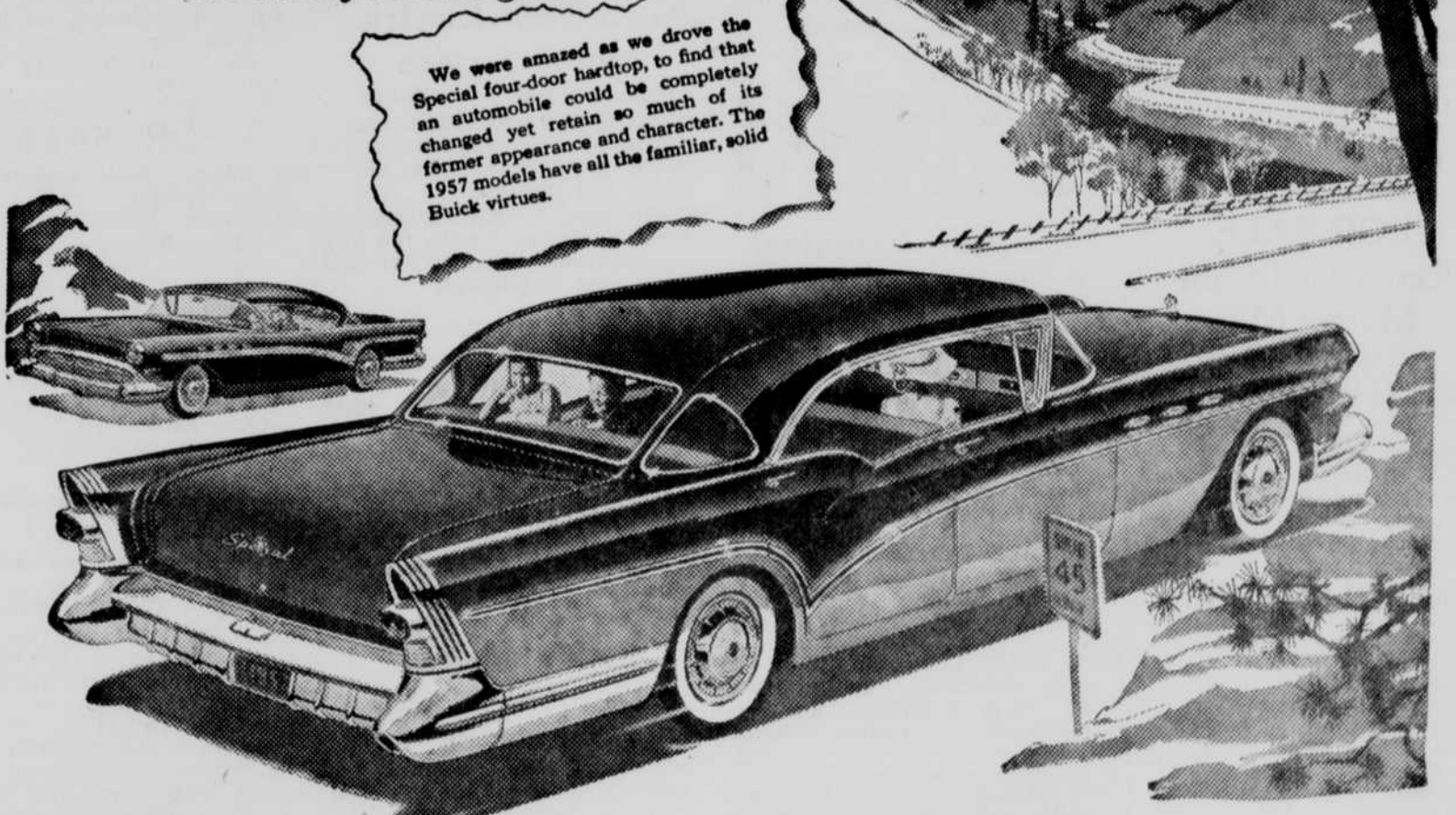
