SMA Nun in Italy Tells of Visit to Assisi Shrine

Sister M. Laurissa, former junior class teacher at St. Mary's academy, has been in Rome, Italy, since last August. Sister Laurissa is instructing adult classes in English. Her letters to St. Mary's give enthusiastic accounts of her sight-seeing tours of historical places of interest in and around Rome. She is a member of a Congregation which follows the Rule of the 13th century's great leader, Francis of Assisi.

In her letter last week, Sister Laurissa described her visit to Assisi: "Of course, the most outstanding of the places I have visited was Assisi. We had left Rome at 8:15 A. M., and arrived in Assisi about 11:30 A. M. In order to capture the spirit of St. Francis so evident in this quaint little village, one must really be there in person. It is impossible to describe the feeling that comes over a Franciscan as the train approaches Assisi and one looks out over that lovely little town snuggling along the sides of the high hills and thinks of the mysterious secret that lies hidden in all that exterior loveliness.

"The buildings are all of stone and stucco and are of one color, even the tile roofs—a light brown or tan.

"All are about the same height and from a distance they actually seem to be connected."

Sister Laurissa does not know how long she will remain in Rome. Next year's assignments have not as yet been made. She is a native of O'Neill and has three sisters in the same Fran-

ciscan community. The motherhouse is in Rome where Sister Laurissa is at present stationed. Mrs. Ed (Irene) Johnson of Omaha and Mrs. Thomas (Eva) Mains of Denver, Colo., are also sisters of Sister Laurissa. They came from the Thomas Tierney family, early residents here.
