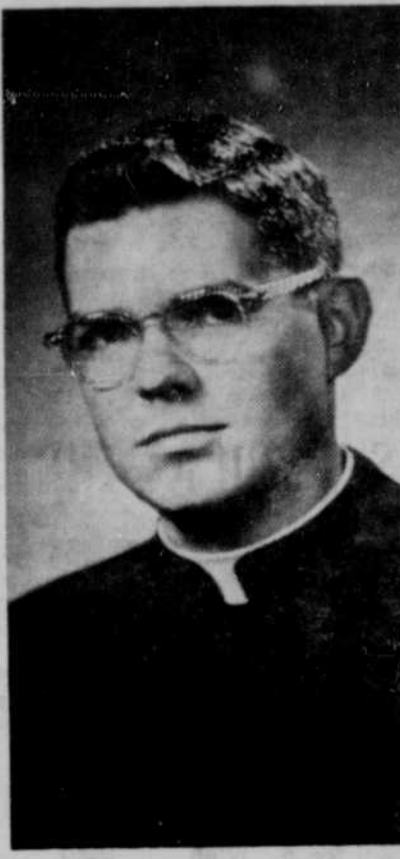

The Nebraska state railway commission has set a hearing for 9:30 a.m., Monday, July 29, at the courthouse in Valentine on the Chicago & North Western railroad's application for authority to discontinue trains 13 and 14 between Omaha and Chadron.

The trains are the last two remaining passenger - mail - express trains serving all of north-east and north-central Nebraska and much of north-west Nebraska and southern South Dakota.

For three years C&NW has been attempting to discontinue these two trains. The Save-the-Trains association is in opposition.
