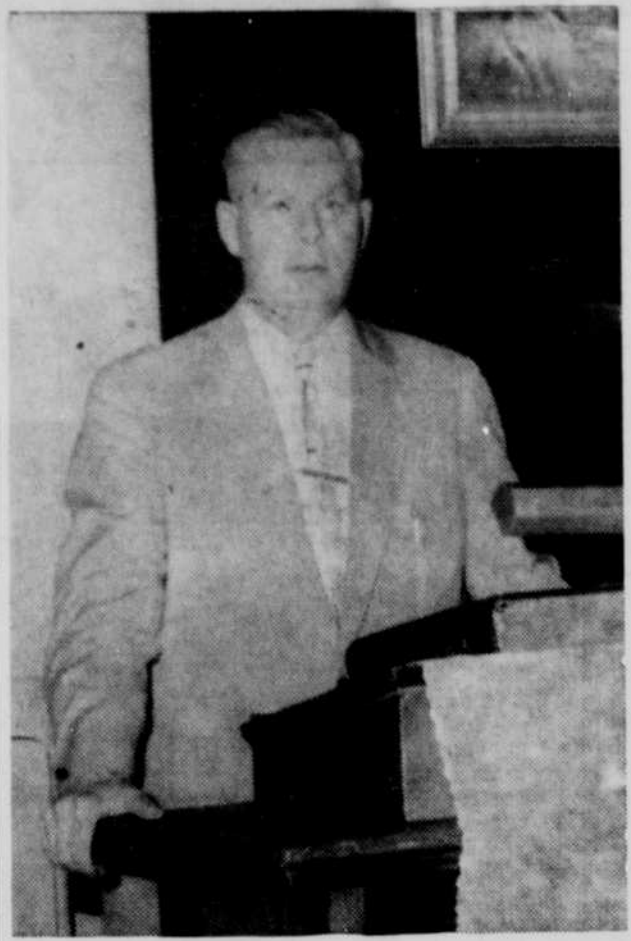

**Baking Hints Helpful**

**Boyd Women Tour Hastings**

LYNCH — Thirty-nine women from Monowi, Lynch, Bristow, Spencer and Naper, all members of Boyd county extension clubs, went by chartered bus to Hastings Wednesday, June 12, for an all-day tour of points of interest.

The bus left Lynch at 5 a.m., and picked up women at Bristow and Spencer. First stop was at O'Neill for a cup of coffee. The group traveled southward through Bartlett and Greeley where the land is sandy. Not too many cattle were observed in pastures.

Several detours were encountered where the highway was under construction.

Entering the Wolbach locality the Boyd county women were pleased to find prosperous farming country again and the crops appeared to be about two weeks ahead of Boyd. Much of the corn already had had its first cultivation. Wheat fields looked "excellent."

The detour route took them by Cushing, then St. Paul, across the Loup and Platte rivers. The countryside "looked beautiful" and evidenced plenty of rainfall thus far.

After leaving Grand Island, Hastings came up very shortly. First place visited was the

Mode O' Day factory. There were about one hundred seamstresses at work—each trying to put out the highest number of sewed garments in order to get their bonus for the day.

It was difficult to believe that 256 dozen blouses were being cut in about 10 minutes by one person.

Next stop was at the Debus bakery. The escort was thorough in his explanations. The firm has 56 routes. The guide explained the following quantities are used in one week: Five tons of lard, seven tons of sugar, 100 tons of flour, 2½ tons of yeast.

The Boyd women witnessed the entire process of making, baking and wrapping several kinds of bread, several varieties of rolls, doughnuts and other bakery products.

Debus makes 935 loaves of bread every 15 minutes, and 300 doughnuts in one hour. Fifty-five loaves of bread are wrapped in one minute. Several of the group gleaned some helpful baking hints from the professionals.

Treats were fresh doughnuts — and were they good!

After dinner the group went to a potato chip factory, and saw the entire process of the raw potato turned into packaged potato chips. Freshly fried potato chips were distributed to their visitors.

Several hours were spent in the House of Yesterday. It was the first visit to a large museum for several of the women.

Next visit was to the Hastings TV station, staying for three programs, two of which were live. The group saw their own pictures on the screen on the homemakers' program.

The program chairman served cookies for lunch.

Next stop was at the Hastings ammunition depot.

The tour stopped at Grand Island for supper. The stores were open for the evening so the women browsed for a couple of hours. A visit was made to the Veterans hospital at Grand Island.

The rest of the trip was uneventful, singing songs and playing railroad spelling. "It was a right good time with all the women getting home by 1 a. m., tired but happy. We found such friendly and courteous people everywhere we went."

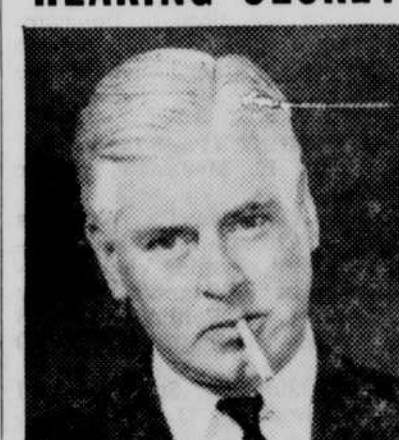

**Entrance Tests for Kindergarten**

"If you have a child whose fifth birthday comes after October 15 and before January 1, and you wish to have him take the test approved by the state board of education for entrance into kindergarten next year, make arrangements for such tests with the county superintendent's office soon."

This was stated Wednesday by Holt School Supt. Alice French.

The testing will be done August 5, 6, and 7, but arrangements must be made soon.

The examination will be administered by Dr. Dan Clifton of the University of Nebraska, who has been certified by the state department. The requirements will continue to be a mental, physical, emotional and social age of at least 5 years 6 months which will make it difficult for a child to pass. A fee of \$5 plus a share of examiner's expenses will be charged.

No tests are given to five-year-old children to determine eligibility for entrance into the first August Class.

Education 61 "Human Development and Behavior", a three-hour course from the University of Nebraska, will convene at the O'Neill public school Monday, August 5, at 9 a. m. for registration. There are no prerequisites for his class which Doctor Clifton will teach.
