Two-Day Grass Tour Scheduled

The annual Holt county grassland tour will be held Monday and Tuesday, July 1 and 2. The tour will begin at 1 p.m., Monday at the west edge of Emmet, visiting Joe Wagman's seeding of native grasses on sandy land. Next stops will be made as follows: John Dvorak, Jr., at east edge of Atkinson, seeding switch grass in rows for seed production; Lawrence Pacha ranch, fertilizer tests on native meadow; E. E. Gotschall, fertilizer tests on meadows—both plots and large acreage application. Next day—Tuesday—the tour will assemble at the courthouse annex at 1 p.m. There will be a discussion of equipment needed for grass seeding and the soil conservation's district's planter will be shown. Tuesday's stops include: Clarence Ernst ranch, fertilizer on native grasses and reseeded of land to grass; Frank Peter ranch, fertilizer on meadow and seeding in of legumes; Inman Methodist church land; fertilizer tests by the col-

lege and the Lincoln Fertilizer company. Additional stops might be arranged. County Agent A. Neil Daves said. E. M. Brouse, extension agronomist, will lead the discussions.
