Visit Homestead, Old School —

5 Sisters Reunite Here

Five sisters, who were reared in Holt and Boyd counties and left this locality during the World War I period, last month returned to the scenes of their childhood. They tramped the family farms, visited their old school-room, and renewed acquaintances. The women are daughters of the late Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Ott, who homesteaded near Butte and later farmed in the Joy community near O'Neill. Five of the Ott sisters became nurses in the Nashville, Tenn., area. Intervening years have seen them scatter to Ceylon, Thailand, and other parts. The sisters who gathered here for a reunion: Mrs. Stanley (Ofa) Phillip of Columbus, Ceylon, home on leave; Mrs. Arthur (Lera) Roberts of Albuquerque, N. M., who last year returned from Thailand; Mrs. Chester (Noma) Sittel of Nashville; Mrs. Baxter (Ollie) Key of Carthage, Tenn.; and Mrs. Benton (Cecile) Sparkman of Franklin, Tenn.

"When we visit the hospital and in certain circles in Nashville we are still known as 'the Misses Otts'." Mrs. Sparkman has one daughter with five children. Mrs. Sittel's husband is a bank-er. The unusual Christian names were acquired from literature, the sisters told The Frontier. The name Lera was borrowed from a chapter in a book; the name Ollie was taken from a novel.
