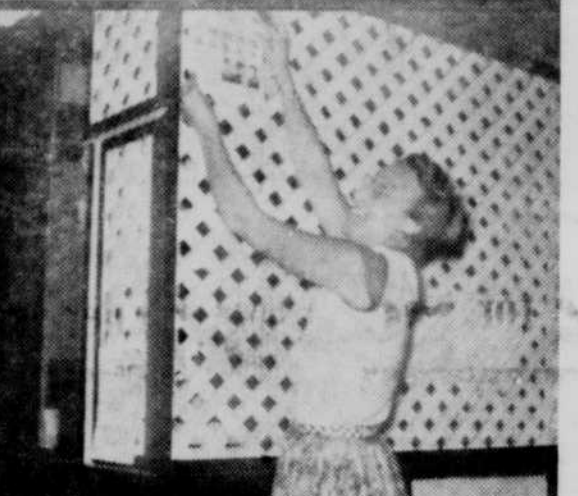

Dustin Postoffice Is Closed

DUSTIN—Another small postoffice in Holt county has been stricken from the postal records.

Friday, July 26 was closeout day for the Dustin postoffice and also retirement for Postmaster Henry R. Stahlacker.

Mr. Stahlacker, although no longer postmaster, will continue for the present to operate the Dustin store and filling station.

Dustin was established in 1886 by Bill Dustin and grew into a thriving village. In its heyday it counted two schoolhouses, Saunders printing shop and newspaper, drug store, grocery and dry goods stores, livery barn, blacksmith shop, millinery store, Louie Dustin's photo shop and a dental office. The late Dr. L. J. C. Richards practiced dentistry here in the early days.

One large building houses the Stahlacker family, general store, filling station and—until last Friday—the postoffice.

Most of the postal patrons will be served by Butte, Stuart, and

Naper rural routes.

In the pioneer era mail was taken from postoffice-to-postoffice by Stuart, Brodie, Cleveland, Grand Rapids, Laura and others on the circuit with Dustin.

A few of the patrons here had box distribution of mail.

Mr. Stahlacker was acting postmaster from late 1948 until he spring of 1949.

Many collectors of postmarks sent letters for cancellation and autographs. There were 250 letters accumulated for "last day cancellation".

Mrs. Stahlacker taught the Dustin school until the district was consolidated. The schoolhouse was sold and moved to the Weller ranch.

Mr. and Mrs. Stahlacker and daughter, Laura, have all assisted at the wayside stopping point and mail center in this extreme northwest Holt locality.

G. L. ("Gus") Obermire, present Stuart-Naper-Dustin mail carrier,

began making stops six times a week at Dustin July 1, 1930. When roads became blocked with snow, Gus frequently resorted to carrying mail on horseback. In later years he employed his "snowbuggy"—a contraption that carried the mail when other vehicles faltered.

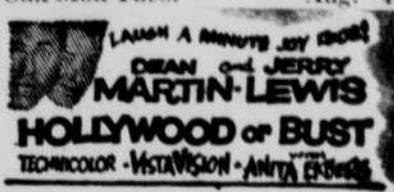

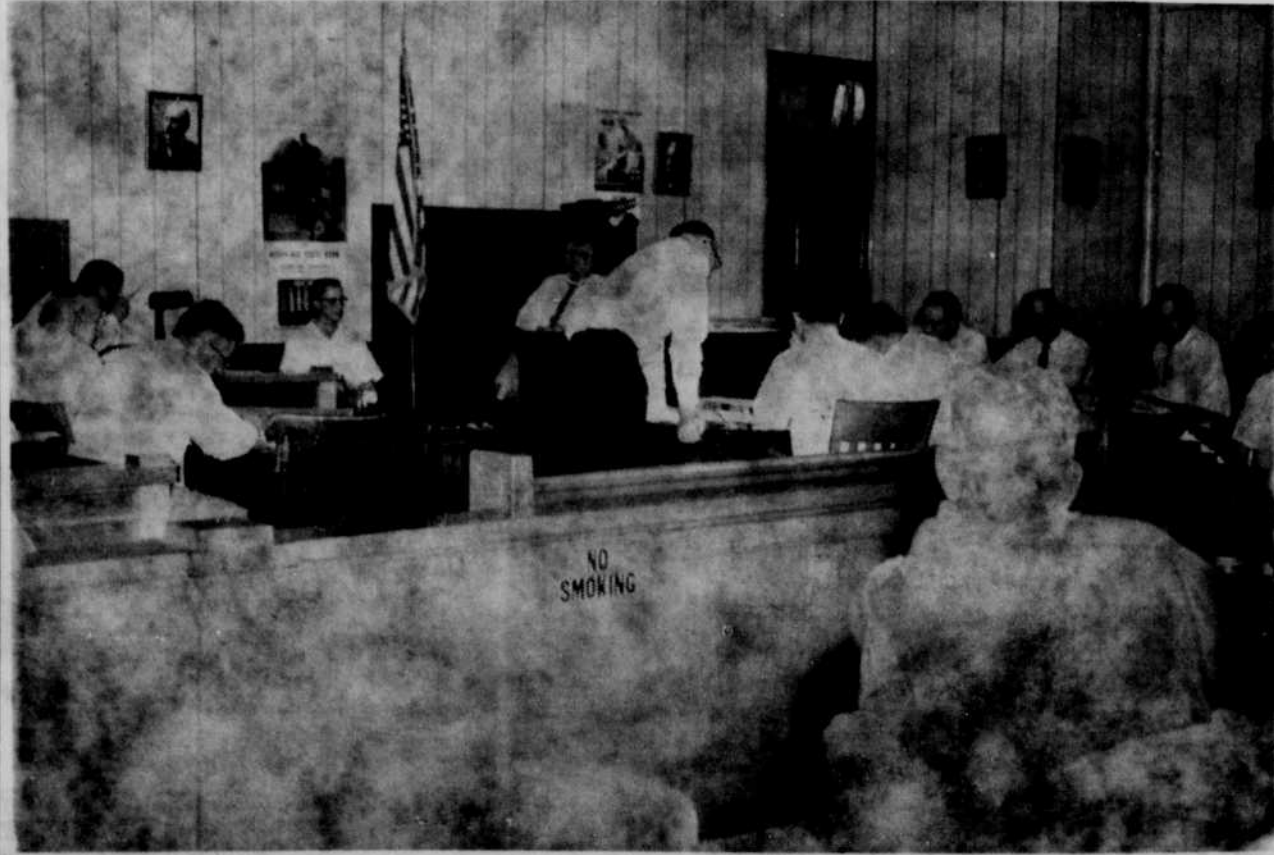
