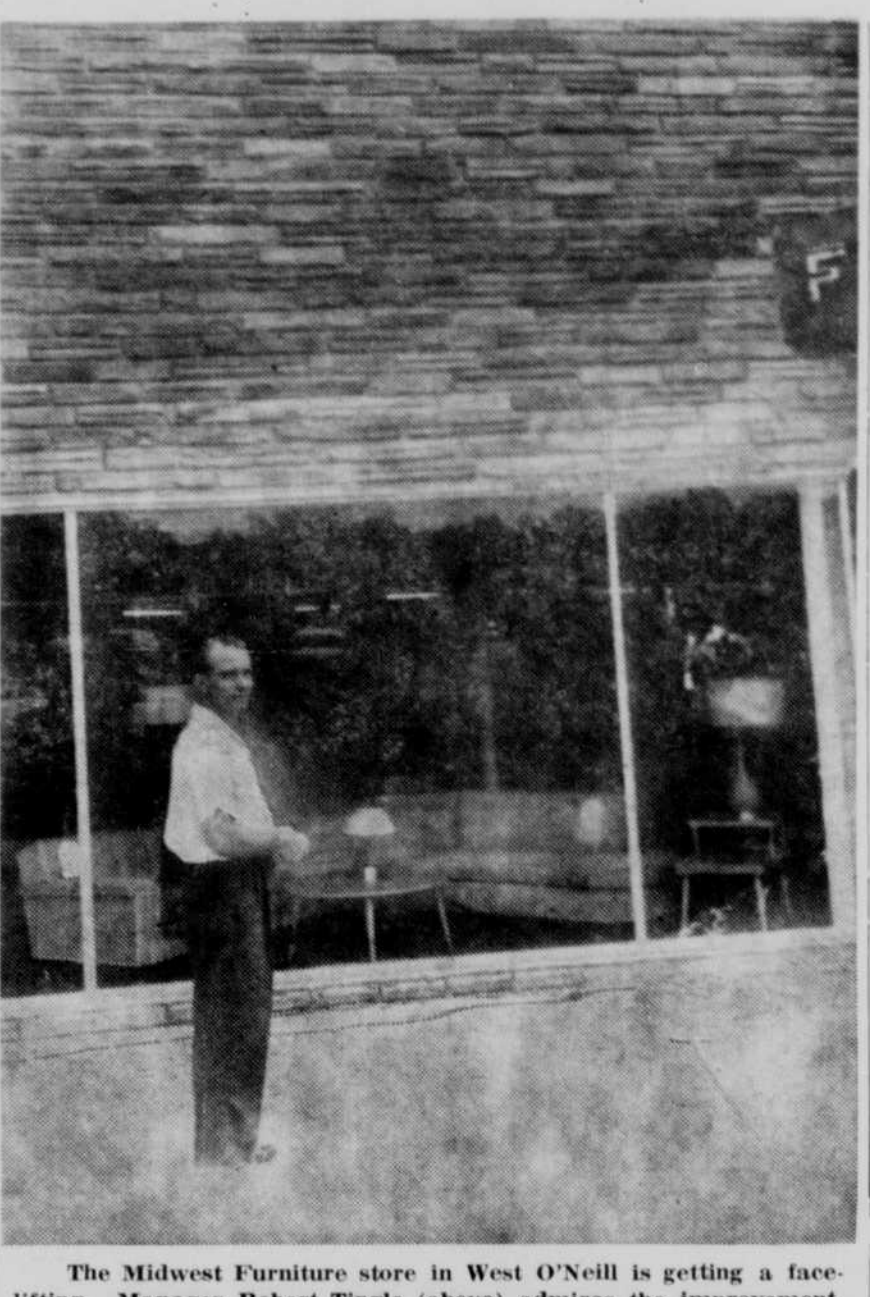
Faculty Honored
