John Grof, 70, Dies at Atkinson

ATKINSON—John Grof, 70, a lifelong resident of the Atkinson community, died early Thursday, August 22, in Atkinson Memorial hospital. He had been hospitalized over two weeks and had suffered a lingering illness. Funeral services were conducted at 9 a. m. Saturday, August 24, at St. Joseph's Catholic church. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery. Rev. Robert Morocco officiated. The rosary was recited Friday evening at Seger's funeral chapel. Pallbearers were Frank Kilnurry, Alex Frickel, Ray Pease, Dale Stevens, Peter Gonderinger and Henry Heiser. The late Mr. Grof was born August 16, 1887, on a farm nine miles southeast of Atkinson, a son of Peter and Magdalena Schmit Grof. He lived on the farm southeast of town until 1913. On January 29, 1913, he married Mary Ramold and the couple moved onto a farm 12 miles northeast of town. Mrs. Grof died in 1927. Mr. Grof retired in the fall of 1948. For the past 3 1/2 years he had been making his home with his son, Harvey, in Atkinson.
