Cards Subs Roll Against Lynch

Niobrara, Verdigre Are Next

Coach Don Templemeier's St. Mary's academy Cardinals made a strong start Thursday night in their bid for Niobrara Valley conference eight-man grid honors. They poured a 61-0 defeat on the visiting, undermanned Lynch high school team.

The Cards rolled to touchdowns on three out of the first four scrimmage plays, which spelled early disaster for the Lynch crew.

Jim McGinn tallied on the second play of the game. Tom Donohoe hit pay dirt the next time SMA took over. Gene Schneider sped 38 yards to score on the first play after Templemeier had inserted the first stringers back in the lineup.

Templemeier limited the varsity to 11 offensive plays, giving the reserves plenty of experience.

Ronnie Clark romped into the endzone once from the 18-yard line. Bill Craig tallied once from Lynch's eight before relinquishing the proposition to the third string.

In the fourth stanza the SMA third-stringers punched across two TD's as Ronnie Ross scored standing up from the six, and Gale Stevens bootlegged the ball into the endzone from the 10.

The Tigers' only threat came in the second stanza when they drove to SMA's eight. The Cards settled down, pushed the invaders back to their own 38.

SMA racked up 279 yards in rushing and 59 yards in passing. The Tigers finished the evening with a net loss of 10 yards. Lynch tried the air twice. One pass was intercepted and the other was incomplete.

The Cards take to the road Friday afternoon for their first game away. They'll be gunning for win number 4. Next Tuesday the Cards will host the Verdigre Hawks in a homecoming fray.

After two unhappy starts, the O'Neill high Eagles managed a 21-6 victory over the visiting Burwell high Longhorns Friday night in Carney park. The Eagles went into the game hungry for a win. Last year they won one, tied one and lost five. With 1937 losses to Plainview and Bassett already this season, the Eagles were due—and came through!

Coach Ray Magaman of Burwell, first year coach, has a team dominated by underclassmen, and the O'Neill hands evidenced more experience in most departments. However, the Longhorns will be something to reckon with next year—especially if Burwell has only one senior as a regular.

The first half was scoreless with neither team penetrating deeply.

After the second-half kickoff, O'Neill rolled to a touchdown with Mel Luben cranking off right tackle from the three to score. Jim Larson, right half, swept end for the point.

O'Neill scored TD resulted when fleet-footed Ronnie Smith broke loose over his left side and raked 40 yards.

O'Neill's third TD came early in the fourth on a sustained drive which was climaxed when Luben plunged from the four.

Larson romped end for the PAT.

Burwell's tally came in the third after completion of a pass that covered half the field. Burwell's left half scored off-tackle on a quick drive.

Luben, senior fullback weighing 170 pounds, looked good offensively for the Blues, and Jim Larson playing end defensively, showed well on defense. Bob Wheeler, a hunk of rock at left tackle, looked good for the winners.

Creighton is next for O'Neill. The game will be played Friday night at Creighton. The Eagles will be out to avenge a 0-6 reversal here a year ago.

Creighton has defeated Tilden but dropped games to Atkinson and Hartington high.

The Balers were given another try from the Valentine 1 1/2-yard-line, but Valentine held.

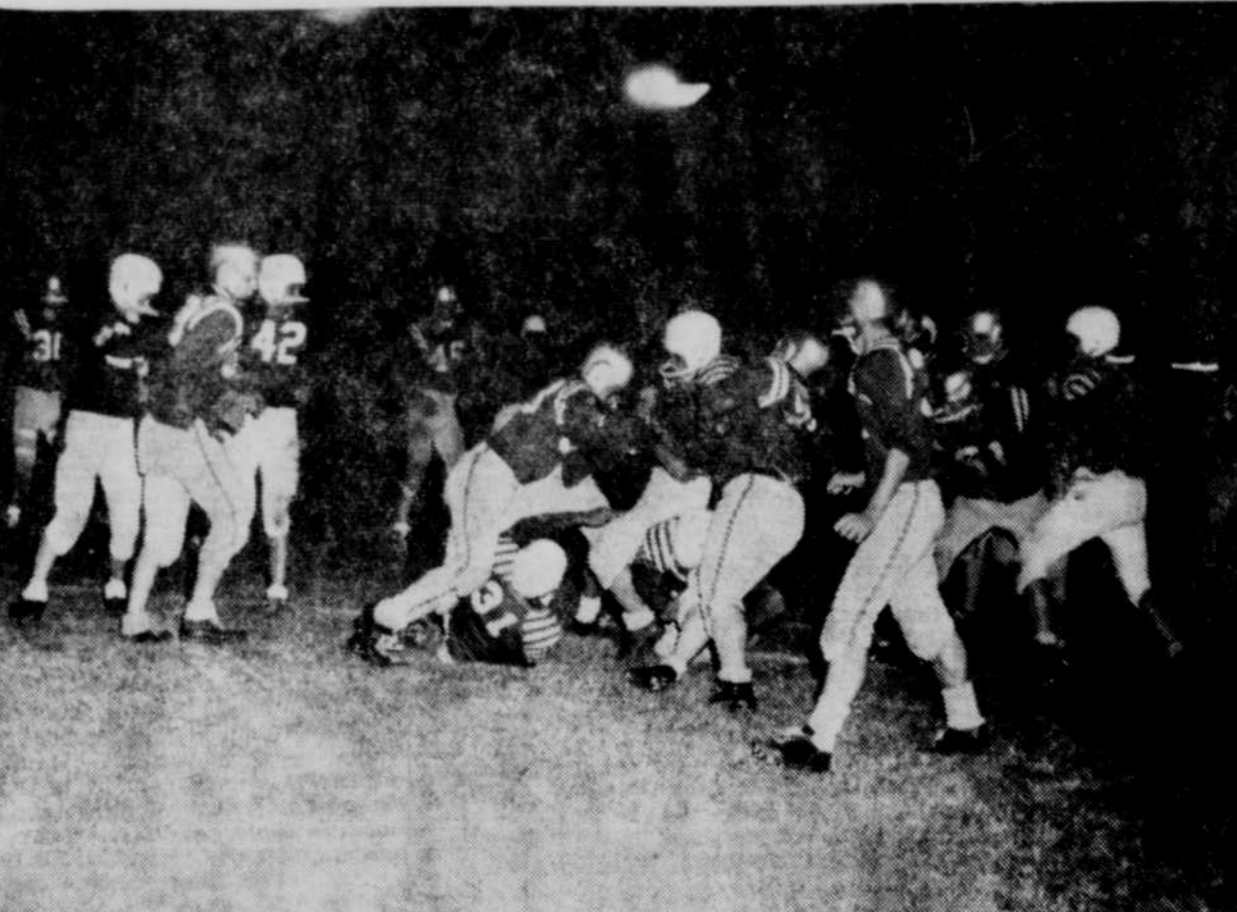
