Next meeting is to be held May 23-24, 1958, at LaCrosse, Wis.

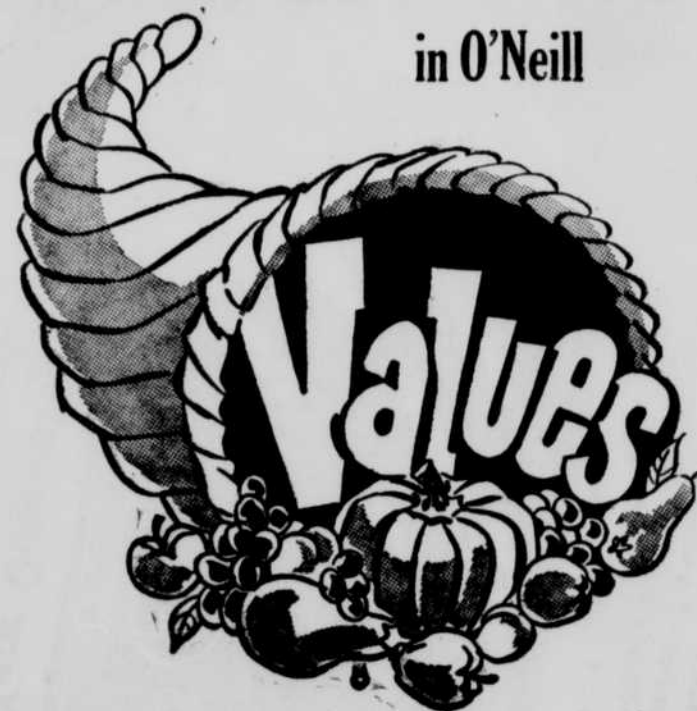
