**Lunker Hunters' O'Neill Visitors**

Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Lawrence, publishers of the Heron Lake (Minn.) News, were recent weekend guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll W. ("Cal") Stewart.

The Lawrences each summer venture by land, air and water to the near Arctic circle country of northern Saskatchewan to fish.

Each year they turn back more than a ton of pike or feed damaged catches (that don't measure up) to the Eskimo dogs. The fish turned back were under 25 pounds.

On occasion they take their pontoon-equipped plane to breaks in the ice, sit on a wing tip and haul 'em in one-after-another.

Mr. Lawrence holds the province record on pike—a 31-pounder that measured more than 50 inches.

Mr. Lawrence is author of several books on "Lunker Hunting" and contributes articles to outdoor magazines.

When he landed the trophy pike (31-pounder), the word was radioed by plane radio to the mounted police and provincial game headquarters. Immediately officials flew to the Lawrences' location, confirmed the catch, took specimens of scales and other data for study.

Mrs. Lawrence is the former Persa Ross of Laurel. Mr. Lawrence formerly was in newspapering at West Point and Laurel.

Mr. Lawrence's writing, expert still and motion picture taking

and his skill on the hook qualify him as an authority.

He is demanded in Minnesota for speaking and showing films on "Lunker Hunting."

Mrs. Lawrence was the first white woman to invade thousands of square miles of the lake country near the Arctic. Sometimes the nearest living person is up to 60 miles away and that "neighbor" is a lonely fur trapper.
