Ak-Sar-Ben Scholarships Largest at Nebraska University

Ak-Sar-Ben, the Omaha civic organization which annually finances the greatest number of scholarships for students attending the University of Nebraska, entertained its 39 scholarship recipients at a recent luncheon given in their honor in Lincoln.

Among the 150 honored guests attending the third annual scholarship luncheon were Lt. Governor and Mrs. Charles Warner, Chancellor and Mrs. R. G. Custavson of the University of Nebraska, the University Board of Regents, and members of the university's faculty committee on scholarships.

The Omaha delegation, including the Ak-Sar-Ben Governors and Councillors and their wives, was headed by Governor V. J. Skutt, chairman of the organization's scholarship committee, and the reigning King and Queen of Ak-Sar-Ben, J. Francis McDermott and Marcia Kathryn Bekins.

Ak-Sar-Ben, the university's largest donor, annually gives the financial aid to students who are working their way through the

College of Agriculture, and in addition provides scholarships for 18 other students at Iowa State College. Mr. Skutt said the scholarship program is aimed directly at Nebraska's agricultural future. "The program is intended to encourage students to carry the methods and practices they have learned at college back to their farm communities for the constant advancement of Nebraska's agricultural economy," Mr. Skutt said.

Ak-Sar-Ben President W. B. Millard, Jr., called the program one of the organization's most important activities in building a better Nebraska and a greater Middle West, and he promised that Ak-Sar-Ben will continue the program as long as it is financially able to do so.
