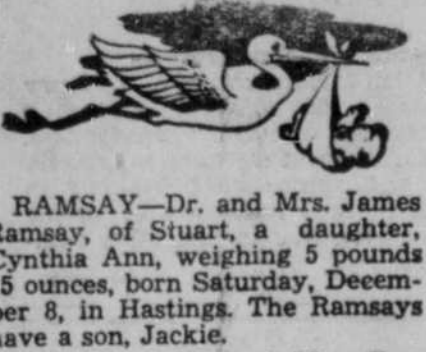

Both games had special significance. The Josies, a former power in state basketball circles, are accustomed to punishing the Hill-toppers. Not so Thursday night at Atkinson. The loss Tuesday evening to the Trojans at Hartington spelled the first reversal of the season for Duke Kersensbrock's kids.
