egg whites (takes 8 to 10 egg whites), ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 11/4 cups sifted granulated sugar, 3/4 tea-spoon almond extract, 1/2 cup coconut, shredded. Sift flour once, measure and sift 4 times. Beat egg whites and salt with flat wire whisk. When foamy, add cream of tartar and continue beating until eggs are stiff enough to hold up the new house. They have the many of the homemakers' hints in peaks, but not dry. Fold in sugar carefully, 2 tablespoons at a time, until all is used. Fold in flavoring. Then sift small amount of flour over mixture and fold in carefully. Continue until all is used. Pour batter into ungreased angel food cake pan. Sprinkle with coconut. Bake in a slow oven at least 1 hour. Begin at 275 F. and after 30 minutes increase heat slightly 325 F. and bake 30 minutes. Invert pan 1 hour.


