

Get 4 pounds of veal shoulder or shank meat and knuckle bone from the butcher. Cover meat and bone with water. Add ½ cup carrots, ¼ cup choped onion. ¼ cup celery and allow to simmer until the meat is tender. Drain and reserve the broth. Let the broth simmer until it is reduced to 1 cup. Strain, cool and skim it. Dice or grind the meat and add to broth. Season with salt and pepper. Decorate the mold with slices of 3 hard cooked eggs. Pack in veal mixture and chill.
