### Riley Canaday, 76, Ewing Man, Dies

EWING—Funeral services for Riley Canaday, 76, of Ewing, were conducted Sunday, April 20, at the Methodist church here. Rev. C. C. Chappel officiated and burial was in the Ewing cemetery.

Mr. Canaday died at 3:45 p.m., Friday, April 18, at his home in Ewing.

He was a son of Zimri and Mary E. Canaday and was born May 31, 1875, at Weeping Water.

In 1882, he moved with his parents and brothers to the homestead 3 1/2 miles south of Ewing on Cashe creek where he grew to manhood.

Mr. Canaday was united in marriage with Claire May Morsbach on June 3, 1907. To this union was born three sons.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Claire, whose death occurred in February, 1917; and one brother, Ernest.

Mr. Canaday married Mrs. Cora Rehmsteadt on October 5, 1918. Mr. and Mrs. Canaday made their home for a period of three years on a farm near Paxton. In 1921, they moved to a farm near Ewing, where they resided until 1930, after which they made their home in Ewing.

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### Half of Tax Dollar Goes to Schools

The Nebraskan who complains about his property taxes could learn a few things from the annual report submitted recently by State Tax Commissioner Philip K. Johnson:

Although the state's total property tax bill rose from \$107,500,000 in 1950 to \$120,500,000 last year, it took less of the citizens' income, percentage-wise, to pay the bill—6.1 percent against 6.5 percent.

Half of the average Nebraskan's property tax dollar goes for schools. Twenty cents pay for state government, 16 cents goes to city and village government, 12 cents pays the county and the rest is divided among township taxes, rural fire district levies and road district taxes.

Although the total assessed valuation of the state has climbed over the \$3 billion mark for the first time in 20 years, a gain of 39 percent in the past five years—the added valuation hasn't been enough to cut either mill levies or total taxes.

### Promotion

A promotion came last week to one of the capitol's most deserving public servants.

He is 60-year-old Clay Wright, a longtime farmer and rancher in McPherson county, who was named by Governor Peterson to succeed the late Rufus M. Howard as director of the state department of health and inspection.

Wright has been chief of the motor fuels division in the department for the past 7 years and is one of the most-respected officials in state government.

Meanwhile, Harry H. Batey, of Lincoln, has been named acting director of the state employment service by labor commissioner Donald P. Miller. He succeeds C. H. Rhoades who held the post since 1946. Rhoades will become manager of the reception center for Mexican nationals at El Paso, Tex. Batey has been a field supervisor with the agency.
