The Nebraskan who camplains about his property taxes could learn a few things from the annual report submitted recently by State Tax Commissioner Philip K.

Although the state's total property tax bill rose from \$107,500,-000 in 1950 to \$120,500,000 last year, it took less of the citizens' income, percentage-wise, to pay the bill-6.1 percent against 6.5 percent.

Half of the average Nebras-kan's property tax dollar goes for schools. Twenty cents pay for state government, 16 cents goes to city and vilage government, 12 cents pays the county and the rest is divided among township taxes, rural fire district levies and road district taxes.
