## Tom Lynch Host to Stuart Band

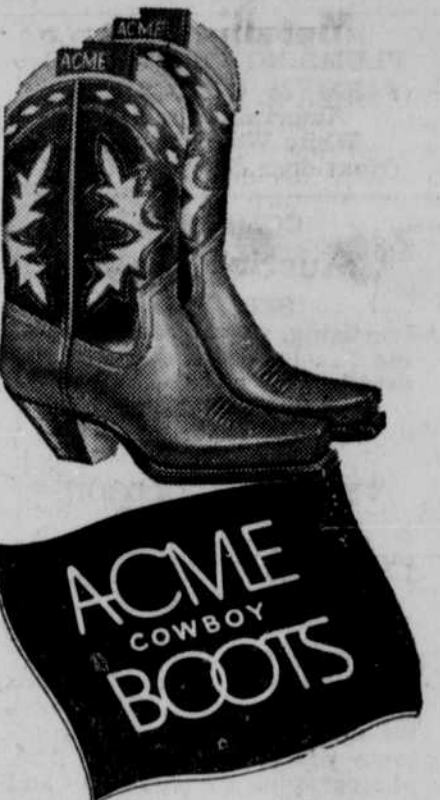
STUART — Tom Lynch was host to members of the band and their parents at a picnic in Hidden Paradise at Lone Pine Sunday, June 8.
