

Prange Rites at St. John's Church Moves in Covered Wagon at 19

ATKINSON—Funeral services for a longtime Atkinson resident, Mrs. Fritz Prange, 75, were conducted Wednesday, July 2, at St. John's Lutheran church here. Burial was in Wood Lawn cemetery.

The late Mrs. Prange died on Monday, June 30, at 4 a.m., in the O'Neill hospital.

Kathryn Wipky Frahm, daughter of Henry and Christina Frahm, was born August 23, 1876, at Malmo. She was 19-years-old when she moved with her family from Lodgepole back to Malmo in a covered wagon.

Fritz Prange and Kathryn Frahm were married at Prague in the Lutheran church on November 2, 1898. She was baptized, confirmed, attended school and married in the same church.

The Pranges moved to Valparaiso, later to Plainview and Brunswick and finally to Atkinson, where they resided continuously until Mrs. Prange's death.

Survivors include: Widower, Fritz; sons—Arthur and Louis, both of Atkinson, and Walter of Bloomfield; daughters—Mrs. Earl (Maudie) Collins and Mrs. Franklin (Ella) Hickman, both of Atkinson; 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Her parents and her brothers, George and Harvey, both of Plainview, and a sister, Emma, preceded her in death.

She was an active member of St. John's Lutheran church until ill health confined her to her home.

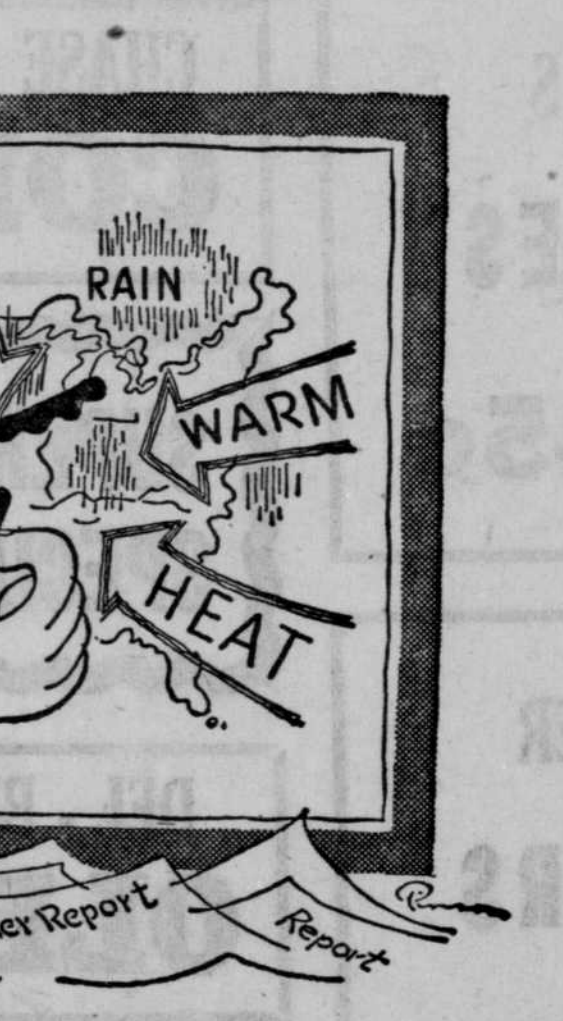
