

O'Neill Woman Regards Century-Old Ice Box Cookie Recipe as Priceless

Do you use garnishes to make foods more attractive? Also, do you eat the garnishes when they are served to you? They are made to be eaten as well as looked at in vitamins.

So goggle down that water cress, parsley, slice of green or red pepper, mint, radish roses and carrot curls used to garnish your plate.

Use chopped parsley with new boiled potatoes served this time of year. If you can't get it fresh, use the dehydrated. Add it to hot vegetables just before serving, too, and to soups.

Lemon wedges for fish and for beverages is most attractive and everyone knows that lemon juice is good for you. Don't forget fruit garnishes for salad plates and serving platters and such.

Use churshed fruit as a garnish for rice, tapioca or cottage pudding. Top cream pies with sliced bananas. Sprinkle paprika on cottage cheese, or cabbage slaw the next time you serve it.

And if you want to save vitamins, follow these cooking commands: Don't stir air into foods while cooking.

Don't put them through a sieve while still hot. Don't use soda in cooking green vegetables.

In boiling foods raise the temperature to boiling point as rapidly as possible.

Use as little water as possible. Don't use long cooking processes such as stewing when shorter methods are feasible.

Don't throw away the water in which vegetables have been cooked. Use it in making gravies, sauces and soups.

Don't fry foods that are rich in vitamins A, B-1 or C. Prepared chopped fruits and vegetable salads just before serving.

Start cooking frozen foods while they are still frozen. Serve raw frozen foods immediately after thawing.

DUTCH TREAT ICE BOX COOKIES

Three and one-half cups sifted flour; 1/2 teaspoon baking soda; 1/2 cup syrup (white or brown); 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 cup butter. Sift together the flour, salt baking soda. Heat butter until soft and creamy, add syrup and sugar, add sifted ingredients and mix well with hands until stiff dough is formed.

Make eight kinds of cookies from the basic recipe above. For coconut cookies, add one cup shredded coconut after the sugar. For chocolate cookies, sift six tablespoons cocoa in the dry ingredients. For chocolate nut: add one cup chopped nuts to the chocolate variation.

For spiced cookies: Add one teaspoon each of cinnamon, cloves, allspice and nutmeg and sift with ingredients. Fruit: add 1/2 cup chopped mixed candied fruits to the dough. Fruit spice: Combine and spice variation given. Raisins: Add one teaspoon each of cinnamon, cloves, allspice and nutmeg, one cup raisins before adding flour.

ORDINANCE NO. 252A CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA

An Ordinance of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, authorizing the issuance of Water Bonds of said City in the principal amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to pay the cost of acquiring a necessary water supply well or wells and for miscellaneous improvements to the water supply and distribution system of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, and providing for the levy of taxes to pay the same.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska:

Section I. The Mayor and City Council of the City of O'Neill find and determine that pursuant to a resolution heretofore duly passed, an election was called to be held on the 22nd day of April, 1952, to submit to the legal voters of said City the question of issuing Water Bonds of said City in the principal amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a necessary water supply well and for miscellaneous improvements to the water supply and distribution system of the City of O'Neill; that notice of said election was given by publication in The Frontier, a legal newspaper published in the City and of general circulation therein for more than

such election, said notice published in the issues of April 3rd, 10th and 17th, 1952; that said election was held at the time and place designated in said resolution and notice in accordance with law, and at said election 137 legal votes were cast on said proposition of which 114 votes were cast for said proposition and in favor of issuing said bonds and 23 votes were cast against the proposition; that the issuance of said bonds has been duly authorized by more than three-fifths of the legal votes of the City cast for and against the proposition at said election; that all conditions, acts and things required by law to exist or to be done precedent to the issuance of said bonds do exist and have been done in due form and time as required by law.

Section II. There shall be and there are hereby ordered issued Water Bonds of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, of the principal amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring a necessary water supply well or wells and for miscellaneous improvements to the water supply and distribution system of the City of O'Neill; said issue shall consist of twelve bonds of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, numbered from one to twelve inclusive, dated August 1st, 1952, and shall bear interest at the rate of two and three-quarters per centum (2 3/4%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of February and August of each year, and the principal thereof shall become due on the 1st day of August, 1972; provided: however, the City reserves the option of paying any or all of said bonds at any time after five years after date. Attached to each bond shall be interest coupons.

Section III. Said bonds shall be executed on behalf of the City by being signed by the Mayor and City Clerk and shall have the City seal impressed on each bond. The interest coupons shall be executed on behalf of the City by being signed by the Mayor and City Clerk either by affixing their own proper signatures to each coupon or by causing their facsimile signatures to be affixed thereto.

Section IV. The Mayor and City Council shall cause to be levied and collected annually a tax on all the taxable property in said City, in addition to taxes otherwise authorized, sufficient in amount to pay the interest on said bonds as the same becomes due, and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due.

Section V. The said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA STATE OF NEBRASKA COUNTY OF HOLT WATER BOND OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL

No. \$1,000.00. KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That the City of O'Neill in the County of Holt and State of Nebraska hereby acknowledges itself to owe and for value received promises to pay to bearer the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000) in lawful money of the United States of America on the first day of August 1972 with interest thereon from the date hereof until paid at the rate of two and three-quarters per centum (2 3/4%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of February and August of each year on presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they severally become due. The City, however, reserves the option of redeeming this bond at any time after five years from date hereof. Both principal and interest hereof are payable at the office of the Treasurer of Holt County in the City of O'Neill, Nebraska. For the prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest, when due, the full faith, credit and resources of said City are irrevocably pledged.

This bond is one of an issue of twelve bonds numbered from 1 to 12 inclusive, of like date and tenor herewith, of a total principal amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) and is issued by said City for the purpose of purchasing a necessary water supply well or wells and

for miscellaneous improvements to the water supply and distribution system of the City of O'Neill in strict compliance with Section 17-534, R. S. Nebraska, and has been duly authorized by more than three-fifths of the legal votes of said City cast for and against the proposition at an election which was duly called and held for that purpose; notice of which election was given by publication in The Frontier, a legal newspaper of general circulation published in said City, for more than two weeks prior to the date of election, and by Ordinance duly passed and published by the Mayor and City Council of said City.

It is hereby certified and warranted that all conditions, acts and things required by law to exist or to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, did exist and have been done and performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that the indebtedness of said City including this bond does not exceed the limitation imposed by law.

The City covenants that it will cause to be levied and collected annually a tax on all the taxable property in said City sufficient in amount to pay the interest on this bond as the same becomes due and to create a sinking fund and the principal thereof as the same becomes due.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Mayor and City Council have caused this bond to be executed on behalf of the City of O'Neill by being signed by its Mayor and City Clerk and by causing the official seal of the City to be affixed hereto, and have caused the interest coupons hereto attached to be executed on behalf of the City by having affixed thereto the facsimile signature of its Mayor and City Clerk and the official seal of the City to be affixed thereto, and have caused their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons.
